22nd July. Your cypher telegram of 9th July.

Mombasa land. Every item shown in my despatch of 15th February is included which could be except (n) and (q).

Item (h) is covered by item one in the second list. Item (f) has been acquired. Item one in the first list represents only items (j) and (k). Item six of the first list as well as items two three five six eight and nine of the second list were not provided for in my despatch of 15th February. The cost of the items in the second list is now estimated by Hobley at £6050 instead of £3500.

In 22753/13 certain items are now
mentioned as being added to

These marked them with a red tick.

The items in the second list, for
which Mr. Bokley originally estimated
only £3500 & for which we asked
Measury approval, have now
risen to nearly double that
figure. Whether this is due to
the knowledge that Govt. is purchasing
land or simply to an underestimate
on Mr. Bokley's part for which he
can be held responsible is not
clear - but I think that we
must ~~allow~~ to Mr. Bokley a right
to Measury to make the
purchase even at an enhanced
price.



I think the main reason for the increase in the staff is
