4. The following figures show the approximate cost of a pedigree bull purchased in England and delivered at a place such as Lumwa, which is at present the most advanced district as regards the dairy industry:-

Purchase price approximately	£40. 0. 0
Railage to London	1. 0. 0
Shipping Agents and Dock charges	1. 10. 0.
Freight to Mombasa	24. 3. 0
Landing charges and forwarding	1. 0. 0
Railage to Lumwa	6. 18. 0
Insurance on £70 @ 6%	4. 4. 0
Total	£78. 15. 0

5. Under present conditions the cost of importing stock from England into this Protectorate is, to all intents and purposes, prohibitive, but could substantial reductions in sea and rail freight be obtained, I am strongly of opinion that the trade would expand at once to the great benefit of the Protectorate.

6. I would add in conclusion that settlers in Australia are now making enquiries with a view to being able to land breeding stock from that country on more favourable terms than at present exist.

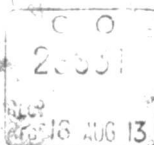
7. It is of course perfectly true that we are not in the same favourable position as the Union of South Africa in regard to the Union Castle Steamship Company as we do not give them any subsidy, but I think that the monopoly of Government goods and passengers which they enjoy justifies our

With reference to your despatch No. 451 of 13th ultimo, I have the honour to forward the following general observations respecting the grant of facilities for importing pedigree stock into the Protectorate.

2. It has been conclusively proved that a large area in the highlands of this Protectorate is suitably adapted for the breeding and raising of pure bred herds from imported stock and that considerable success has attended the grading up of native cattle. I am of opinion also that with the favourable climatic conditions and plentiful supply of green pasture throughout the whole year obtainable in many of these areas, large quantities of dairy produce would be exported from the Protectorate if a better bred strain of stock was in general use for milking purposes.

3. Though conditions are so favourable on the whole, the improvement of stock and the development of the dairy industry have not effected the progress which was hoped for, owing to the heavy cost in freight and other similar causes.
