
Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 456 of the 13th of June on the subject of the grant of British and German flags to dhows on the East Coast of Africa.

2. If the proposal of the Political Agent at Muscat, referred to in the Foreign Office letter of the 10th of June, is enforced, an owner of a dhow desirous of registering his vessel at one of the ports of this Protectorate would be compelled to wait for a period of some two months or more for permission from Muscat before he would be able to do so.

3. It appears possible therefore that the suggestion would involve considerable hardship to the owners of dhows and although it would of course be quite feasible to give effect to it, I am doubtful whether it would be desirable to do so.
