2. With reference to paragraph 2, I
 consider that the interests of Government will
 be sufficiently safeguarded in the event of an
 occupation licence being relinquished, if the
 land in question were to revert to the Crown
 and become available for resale, in which case
 the Government would profit to the extent of the
 instalments already paid.
