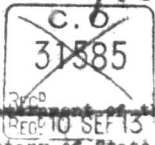

Your cypher telegram of September 5th. Two possible means of occupying the place named, if expense is no object I would recommend that the new Zanzibar Company should proceed direct to the frontier from Nyasaland. As the Juba River will be too low for river transport I must consult Salkeld as to which route would be desirable. The second alternative is to move up half Company from Kulal, but I should not care to recommend this without consulting Hope both as to transport facilities and as to the possibility of evacuating Kulal. Cost of transport will be very much in any case and before I can obtain necessary advice such delay must occur.

On the whole, unless a far more forward and expansive policy is adopted on our northern frontier I feel inclined to recommend that the proposal to threaten Abyssinia be abandoned
