Uganda has an Unallocated Store kept for
Telegraph and Telephone material: maximum
at present £4000. (see Sec/2868/1913 etc).

The O.T.C. of G.A.P. suggests the introduction of
a semi-Tan system in that Prote - and
proposes to provide £5000 for the purpose.
He is providing in the Estimate for 1914-15 for
additions to his staff to manage the unallocated
store.

He points out that when the telegraphic and
telephone systems of the Prote are expanding
rapidly it is often necessary to buy material
in a hurry when high prices are ruling: and
make an adjustment. Many stores do lack
of material: he reasons further that freight
charges are cheaper on large consignments.
The proposal appears reasonable.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that in view of the excessive difficulty experienced in providing for the expeditious expansion of the telegraph and telephone system which the present rapid growth of commercial development in the Protectorate renders necessary the Postmaster General has submitted a recommendation for the establishment of an un-allocated store for telegraph and telephone material.

2. Mr. Gosling points out that under the present system the provision of a new telegraph line or the expansion of the telephonic system occupies considerable time since the material required cannot be ordered from home until the necessary funds have first been obtained and the local reserve of material at disposal would only suffice to meet a very small extension of the system. Moreover, delays incidental in obtaining fresh stock from home are such that even when indentures are forwarded in advance it is difficult for any work of an important nature to reach completion during the financial period in respect of which sanction has been accorded.

I am of opinion that in view of the rapid progress of this Protectorate and the urgent necessity, following as a result, for provision for a correspondingly rapid expansion of the telegraph and telephone system, some arrangement whereby a comparatively large stock of material can be kept at hand in anticipation of future requirements is essential. The draft Estimates for the Post Office Department for the coming financial year contain provision, as regards staff, for the working of an unallocated store. The adoption of such a course would have the financial advantage of obviating the hurried purchase of material, when, possibly, prices rule high and as the depreciation of telegraph and telephone material is not great the investing of surplus balances in such stores would be a sound and economical proceeding from a financial point of view. Furthermore, an additional advantage would be gained by the fact that freight and other charges on comparatively large consignments are proportionately cheaper than on small quantities.

4. Should this proposal meet with your approval I would ask that the sum of £5,000 be allowed for an unallocated store. This amount should be sufficient to meet present requirements.
