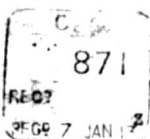

November 28, 1912.

Sir,

I have the honour to report that the estimates for German East Africa for the coming year, which have been approved by the Bundesrat and are to be laid before the Reichstag contain the following provisions as published in the columns of the official organ the Deutsch Ostafrikanische Rundschau in Dar-es-Salaam.

A district court is to be established in New Moschi. This will necessitate the appointment of a district judge, secretary and clerk and forty five other officials e.g. a police superintendent, superintendent of railways, two veterinary surgeons etc.

The conditions of the white non-commissioned officers are to be improved; on the other hand local allowances for officials stationed on the coast are to be abolished.

Administrative funds for local purposes are to be considerably increased. The management of the Government fleetilla, which has been financially unsatisfactory, is to be placed on a more profitable footing by being handed over to the German East

Africa Company on payment of a lump sum.

The district commission office in Kilimandjaro is to be rebuilt, new residences are to be built for officials in Dar-es-Salaam, Tanga and Tabora. The old boma is to be purchased in Dar-es-Salaam and a dredger provided for the harbour. The northern and central railways are to be extended; the existing lines to be completed and new buildings erected. The loan to the German East African Railway Company is to be considerably increased in order to expedite the extension of the central railway.

The Imperial subsidy amounts to Marks 3,603,687. This is somewhat less than the subsidy for last year.
