I am directed by the Secretary of State for India to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 22403 of the 2nd May respecting the grant of British and German flags to ships in the Persian Gulf, and in reply to say that he concurs in the proposal of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to approach the German Government in the manner indicated by you.

This measure taken by the British East African authorities appears to generally adequate, but in the case of persons who may be of mixed origin I am to suggest that the measure proposed by the Political Agent in Jiddah of his office of 21st November 1912 might be adopted in a question of question.
