There was a discussion at the F.O. this
morning with regard to the future of
Abyssinia (the road will be communicated
to us officially) & from what he said I
am informed "as my view that we ought
to try to make our frontier the frontier
more mobile. Sir R. D. has got about
800 miles of frontier & patrol on the
Abyssinian side & he has found that a more
mobile force & more frequent patrols work much
better than the old system of placing
small detachments at fixed stations along
the line. The Camel Corps I understand shows

what can be done by a very mobile force
even if it is a small one.




