Sir,

With reference to your despatch No 10 of the 16th of April last, I have the honour to report that I have at last received the promised communication from the Italian Government on the subject of transit and trans-shipment regulations in Jubaland.

In the Italian draft there is no essential difference from that in the draft which we had submitted, but one or two alterations are suggested as more closely interpreting the spirit of the agreement entered into by the Commissions of 1910 and 1912.

The Italian Government also consider that such portions of the Estalozzi-Harding Agreement of May 26th 1898 as are not superseded by the new proposals, and have a permanent value may advantageously be incorporated in the final text of the agreement. This has been done in their new draft, and from a first glance at the text, I gather that the retention of several of these stipulations will be even more valuable to us than to the Italians.

The other three agreements have also to some extent been re-drafted without any material alterations. It will therefore be necessary to make new translations with an explanatory Memorandum which will take some short time to prepare.

I shall forward them at the earliest possible date and hope it may be found possible to deal with these proposals, which involve rather modifications of form than of principle, without further reference to East Africa.
