

Sir:-

I transmit to you herewith copy of a letter from the Colonial Office respecting an encounter which has taken place near the East African frontier between a party of Abyssinians and one of the Protectorate frontier patrols.

You will see that as the result of this encounter a British Officer, Mr. Lloyd Jones, was severely wounded, while one mukari was killed and another wounded. It is impossible to allow incidents of this nature to pass over without any reparation being offered by the Abyssinian Government, and I have accordingly to request that you will put forward a claim for the payment of compensation to such amount as you may consider advisable.

You should also impress on the Abyssinian Government that this incident affords additional evidence of the baseness
