I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Read's letter of the 4th instant (40261/1912) reporting an excess expenditure of £671 on the amount provided in the East Africa Protectorate Estimates for 1911-12 under the Personal Emoluments Subhead of Head 23a, Agricultural Department Special Expenditure.

In reply I am to state that My Lords will not refuse in the circumstances represented to give Their covering sanction for this additional expenditure on the understanding that the excess can be met from savings available on other Heads of the Protectorate Estimates for 1911-12.

They would be glad however to be furnished in due course with a detailed statement of the reasons which necessitated the expenditure in question.

the matter does not come
to this notice until a date
at which reference is made to the
cause of the recession,

3. Apart from any question
of financial propriety, it is
very convenient that
approval should have to be
obtained hurriedly in

this way. It is, however, to
be presumed that the new
system of District Returns
which has been introduced
will prevent a recurrence
of this irregularity. In all
expenditure not provided for

on the Sanctioned Estimate for
the year must now appear in one
or other of these returns, and
these returns, after examination
in this Deptt, are submitted
to the Treasury for approval.

Mr. There may, nevertheless, be some
items of expenditure, especially
small sums paid by the C.A.
for the Colonies on my instruction,
which might escape notice, and
I therefore beg to request that
you will arrange in the C.A.
accounts to be carefully
watched, so that all items
of expenditure appearing in
these accounts, for which
provision has not been made
in the Estimates, may be
duly inserted in one of the
Quarterly Returns.
