I have laid before the Lord Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Lambert's letter of the 28th ultim. (12/26/1913) and its enclosures, relative to the conditions existing in the East Africa Protectorate in regard to the public health.

Mr. Secretary in Council represents the desirability, in view of these conditions, of obtaining the services of an expert authority on tropical sanitation to visit the Protectorate and examine its sanitary problems on the spot, and proposes accordingly that Professor W.J. Simpson, C.M.G., M.D., F.R.C.P. should be engaged for this purpose.

In reply I am to state that in the circumstances described by Lord's assent (subject to the observations made below) to the employment of Professor Simpson for a period of six months on the terms proposed, on the understanding that the necessary funds can be found from savings on the sanctioned estimate of the Protectorate for the current financial year.

Their Lordships are of opinion, however, that Professor Simpson's remuneration should, if possible, be limited to a maximum of £1,500, and that it should in any case include all allowances for subsistence, outfit &c.

3. The Annual Medical Report of the M.R.C. 1911

was referred to the Advisory Medical and Sanitary Committee of the Tropical Africa, who were able to discuss the matter with the Plano M.O. stationed at Monrovia, and the P.M.O. of the E.A.P.

4. As a result of the report of the Committee Mr. H. suggested to the Gov^r the advisability of obtaining the services of an expert authority on tropical sanitation who could visit the Proje

and examine on the spot the problem with which the local administration has to deal. The Governor has replied accepting the proposal, and recommending that the visit should be made as soon as possible.

4. Mr. Harcourt would accordingly be glad to know whether you would be willing to undertake this visit to the E.A.P. ^{In a few days six months} for the purpose of examining the sanitary condition of the dependency, advising the local Government, and reporting on the form which the sanitary policy of the administration should

take.
