CONTROL OF FINANCES

Consider that the Prot: should now be regarded as self supporting and that the control of finances should from 1st April next be in hand of C.O. Considers however reserve fund should not be allowed to fall below £100,000. Suggests advisability of rule limiting increase in recurrent expenditure by one year to the amount of the increase in the estimated revenue.

Para. 3 - We propose a reserve of £50,000. As matter of fact £100,000 is not enough large, buying it for 5 weeks' revenue, and I think this can be doubled when we start from over this limitation. I have recently calculated that, including all possible calls on us below, at 31st March last, £110,000 will remain, and we know that the extra income a bit profitably, will bring above as expected to amount to about £35,000 of which say £10,000 is to be spent on special salary expenditure. Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Read's letter of the 20th ultimo (26826/1913) * and its enclosures on the subject of the control exercised by this Department over the finances of the East Africa Protectorate.

In reply I am to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Harcourt that in all the circumstances of the case My Lords concur in his opinion that the Protectorate should now be regarded as self-supporting and, subject to the arrangements made below, they assent to his proposal to transfer to the Treasury by the 1st of April next the control of the Protectorate's finances will pass from the Treasury to your Department.

REGARDING had, however, to the capital liabilities of the Protectorate, especially in respect of the Magadi Soda undertaking, My Lords are of opinion that for the present the reserve fund, referred to in the 4th paragraph of Mr. Read's letter, should not be allowed to fall below £100,000.

They would also suggest, with reference to the penultimate paragraph of Mr. Bowring's despatch of the 9th July last (525), the advisability of a rule limiting the increase in the Protectorate recurrent expenditure in any one year to the amount of the increase in the estimated revenue.
