With reference to your despatch No. 727 of the 2nd of December last you will have already received my despatch No. 729 of the 10th Iden concerning with the proposals made for placing the whole medical Staff on a permanent and pensionable basis subject to a 3 years period of probation and the satisfactory completion of a course of Tropical Medicine.

2. With the adoption of this principle I would propose that the four Medical Officers hitherto classed as "temporary" viz. Messrs. Chell, Lamb, Mount, & Clark should subject to their obtaining or being in possession of the necessary pass in Tropical Medicine be recommended for induction in the permanent Staff as their probationary periods are completed; but I would strongly recommend that in future probationary appointments should be filled by officers who are already in possession of a pass in Tropical Medicine, in order to do away with the system of medical Officers taking this pass during their first leave of absence with consequent extensions of leave and disorganization of relief.


3. All my proposals will remain to the four  
Medical Officers in force to call an "Temporary" one  
approved they will now become "probationary", and there  
will be one further "probationary" appointment to be  
filled consequent on the termination of the latter.  
4. For this I would recommend Dr. Chatterjee who  
is at present temporarily employed on strength  
of his services.

He is already in possession of a post in

will be detailed for work  
at the sleeping  
sick camp, but

rather that any  
medical officer who  
has interested himself  
in this kind of work  
should deal with

the sleeping sickness  
cases. At present

there are certain temporary

rise in the normal

apps., so that  
these "temporary" apps.
