The £5 allowance is given to compensate officers for extra expense of travelling by the U.S.S., when they are accompanied by "their wives and families".

So far as C.A. and C.O. know, the question of granting the allowance in respect of a child only has never arisen no doubt because so very rarely do a man and his wife both receive Government passages. However, the allowance is for (one) wife and family (unlimited) - as I suppose that it should be granted for (no wife and) family (strictly limited to one), although I have a sort of feeling that it was never intended to cover a case of this kind.
