With reference to my despatch Confidential, dated Downing Street 17th December 1910, Mr Bayldon, the Managing Director of the Natrobi Electric Lighting Company, and me on my return to-day.

- 2. He was naturally anxious to know the position of his Company as the result of my visit to England since he is preceeding to London to-merrow. I was only able to inform him that the question of the Nairobi Electric supply depended upon decisions which were about to be taken with regard to the status of the Municipality of Nairobi.
- 3. You will be aware that Hr Bayldon primarily proposed to dispose of his Company's property to Government at a certain price, an error which he withdrew and for which he substituted in November 1910 an application both for an additional extension of the period of his contract and for the grant of the use of further water powers on the Thika River to carry out a larger school.
