A few comments and suggestions (rather
cautious I fear) from Library point of view
(based on experience gained by the custody of
several such, e.g., Gazette of all Colonies) may be
of interest—and of use to Mr. Bowning?
modification may be needed, of course, to
suit local requirements or limitations.

It is fair to assume that no matter is put in the Gazette that can't be left out. The S.A.P. is developing rapidly and its Gazette must necessarily expand. A glance at the front volumes shows the rapid increase in the last year or two - the figures being as follows:-

A big factor in the size of the typettes, it seems to me, is the size of the type. You will see from the ETP specimen copies I enclose that the type used in the main is very large (PICA). I think it is unnecessary large. Change to a smaller type even if somewhat expensive at first, as only a change could easily be effected inexpensively, would save a lot of space: — probably one third of the present bulk ~~of the~~ could be saved. A smaller type would be equally legible — and a good model would be

if an issue with a N° was missing
 that fact might be overlooked; whereas if
 an issue with a number belonging to the
 continuous series were missing that fact would
 be known. The E.A.P. gazetteer shall remain
 as it is now i.e. Gazetteer &c. in the
 continuous gazetteer, Supplements placed
 repeatedly (each self-contained).
 The E.A.P. Gazette already has ~~been~~^{had} a
Table of contents (not ~~an~~^a valuable feature) an
 index or table of contents on the back
 of each number. If the index could
 include some sort of classification under
 subject a department it would be an
 advantage - though so slight an advantage
 as not to warrant any appreciable trouble.
 The E.A.P. Gazette is of very handy size
 and any increase in its area is to
 be deprecated. It is at present one of
 the best Gazettes (in form of style of production
 etc.). Has ~~ever~~ received the same at least
 of the ideas I have mentioned may be
 advantageously adopted.
