My wife's only son, by her first  
marriage, Major G. R. Phillips, R. 2.,  
D.S.O., was killed while second  
in command in the Somaliland  
expedition of 1902 -

His eldest son Mr. C. G. Phillips  
2<sup>nd</sup> Bn West Yorkshire Regt.,  
temporarily K.A.R., is now  
on the borders of British East

Africa and Station Somaliland,  
one of two or three English  
Officers with a <sup>small</sup> Camel Corps  
composed of natives.

They have already had  
several brushes with Somali  
tribes, and seeing what  
has happened in British  
Somaliland it seems not  
too probable there may be

a similar disaster on the  
other side before long, unless  
the small force in question  
is recalled before it is too  
late.
