in conn. with proposed removal of memorial

Mr. Donald J. Read

The Governor's despatch was certainly vague.  
I interpreted his proposals to be that the old  
water tanks for cattle should be disposed of,  
and that of the original memorial (tablet  
and water tank) only the tablet should be  
retained. The tablet, I suppose, is to be  
affixed to the wall of the Baraza Hall over, or near to,  
the new drinking fountain.

According to Lady Temmer the inscription on the  
tablet will locate its point when separated  
from the water tanks.

? admin part of the letter say that it is assumed  
that the Govt proposes to insert the tablet in the  
wall of the Baraza Hall, over or near to the new  
drinking well <sup>or fountain</sup> and to dispense with the  
watering tanks: and say that a copy of

proposal of the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate, which I do not quite understand, & in regard of which I should be greatly obliged if you would kindly inform me.

- 1) Is it proposed that the Mosquito-proof matting well with pump & soap
- should be within (or close to) the Monument at the new site in the Centre Square of Kisumu, or would this well be built at some other spot, away from the Memorial?
- 2) Is there any special advantage in the tablet which bears the English & Arabic inscriptions being placed on the

proposal of the Acting  
Governor of the East  
Africa Protectorate, which  
I do not quite understand,  
& in regard to which I  
should be greatly obliged  
if you would kindly  
inform me.

1) Is it proposed that the  
mosquito-proof masonry  
well with pump & roof

should be within or close  
to the Memorial at the  
new site in the Centre  
Square of Kisumu, or  
should this well be built  
at some other spot, away  
from the Memorial?

2) Is there any special  
advantage in the tablet  
which bears the English  
& Arabic inscriptions  
being placed on the

watering cattle will,  
as I understand, no longer  
form part of the Memorial,  
the present inscriptions  
on the tablet will no  
longer be appropriate.

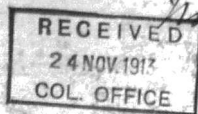
