In view of the uncertainty as to the serum production, he would prefer to have the overseer (only 3 Stock Inspectors + one Lab. Asst. are mentioned in the Estimates) If both

overseer and Lab. Asst. were appointed the total no. of appts. in this connexion would be 7, one in excess of the Estimates.

Your letter of February 28th: regarding
a Laboratory Assistant for Nairobi, and Mr: J, Burton.

In my draft estimates for 1913 - 14 I asked for
two new appointments to be sanctioned - an overseer,
appointed locally on £200, and a Laboratory Assistant
from a Serum Institute at home on the same pay as the
others, i.e. £150 X £10 X to £180. The latter only
appears to have been passed.


The Overseer's duty is to superintend the feeding
and movement of stock, to supervise the native labour,
and generally to take off my hands routine work which
would account for at least four hours daily and would
then be imperfectly done. Mr: Burton has been at the
laboratory, occupying the position and drawing the pay
of a Stock Inspector though performing overseer's duties
since about May last, and he had previous experience
there in 1911. He is consequently au fait with our
methods, and it would be a great set back were another
man to require training. It is, of course, essential
for such work that a man knowing the language and the
Native be appointed - one straight from home would be
valueless for at least a year.

In view of the uncertainty with regard to rinder-
pest serum production I would prefer to forego the
Laboratory Assistant in favour of the more important
post of Overseer, and if such procedure could be sanc-
tioned, to utilise the sanctioned pay of £150 towards

the emoluments of the post for which I consider --
Mr: Burton most suitable.

3. You will observe that Mr.
Montgomery is anxious to retain
Mr. Burton's services, and if I
am right in thinking that no
provision for him at present
exists in the estimates for the
current year it will obviously
be desirable to devote the
salary provided for a Laboratory
Act to this purpose, the deficit
being met ^{by a reduction} from ~~some~~ ^{some} other service.

4. Pending the receipt of your
reply, no steps will be taken
for the selection of a Lab.
Act. but if there is no
difficulty in the matter of
Mr. Burton's salary, and if
you desire to retain both
posts and I can make the
necessary reallocations, I
will arrange for a suitable

as possible.
