

I am aware that these estimates have been rather delayed, but the preparation & typing of the memorandum on details (and in itself an arduous work) has taken a good deal of time. I gathered from you that it will be safer, & anything, is to assume it will be imagined that the Estimates are still in course; so I have omitted details after day by day. It is actually day, however, will be considerably brief, as a large part of the memo. is for use in this Office only.

The details are generally explained fully in the East Africa Protectorate Estimates either in the Budget Statement or in the Statement of Differences. I have not referred in this memorandum to small increases, and where the Colonial Office has already sanctioned increases, I have not commented, as references are given to the Colonial Office authority in the Statement of Differences; but I have checked all the references and where there is any divergence between what was originally approved and what appears at present to be rates I have noted it.

REVENUE.

Head 1. Customs.

1. It has been decided that in 1914-15 the contribution from the East Africa Protectorate to Uganda in respect of customs dues on goods imported via Mombasa shall be £40,000, not £47,500 as provided here. But as East Africa had framed the Estimates on the assumption of a contribution of £47,500, the Governor was informed that the additional £12,500 might be taken from surplus balances. The total of net imports will therefore be £135,000 and the total for this Head £45,000.

2. Every subhead, except exported ivory, shows an increase, in some cases a very large increase: e.g. cotton goods (excluding £6,000 for apparel, haberdashery, and cotton manufactures un-enumerated) an increase of £12,000; building materials (hitherto apparently not estimated for) £12,000; liquors £4,500 (for 1915 no separate unmixed blessing); flour, rice and grain £4,000. Of the exports

exports, hides and skins increase from £6,500 to £7,500.

Head 2. Port, Harbour etc. Dues.

A small decrease of £200 on light dues.

Total £1,300

Head 3. Licences, Excise, etc.

* Game licences increase by £2,000, registration of documents by £50; stamp duties by £2,000. Hut and Poll tax by £9,712, non-native Poll Tax by £2,975, fines and forfeitures by £1,500. Municipal Revenue appears now as a separate sub-head (£1,000) with consequent reductions on other sub-heads e.g. £1,360 on Electricity and water rates. In the Hut and Poll tax estimate £400 is included for the N.P.D.

Total £46,415

Head 4. Fees of Court or Office, etc.

There is a total increase of £7,000 made up of several small increases, e.g. £500 on Fees of Court, Warehouses fees £1,000, testing and dipping fees £4,500, Hospital fees £500, Trolley line receipts £293, Percentage on Government House furniture £50, Cost of Currency Notes Issue Department £655. There is one new item - fees of serum, Vaccine etc. prepared at the Nairobi Laboratory for other Protectorates as well as East Africa itself (£2,000). It is perhaps rather surprising in view of the increasing commercial prosperity that the Crane and pier dues should drop from £3,000 to £2,500.

Head 5. Reimbursements by other Governments.

1. The Uganda Estimates provide only £2932 instead of £3107 as Post Office and Telegraph contribution. We had better keep to the Uganda Estimate in this case. - £175
2. For 1914-15 the Zanzibar military contribution has been fixed at £1,000, but in future years this may be somewhat modified.
3. Pending consideration of the report of the local Committee to be appointed, the Uganda contribution towards Customs collection expenses has been provided on the Uganda Estimates in accordance with the existing practice (£4,200)

Head 6. Posts and Telegraphs.

This Head shows a striking increase of £10,700. Sale of stamps goes up by £8,000; telegraph revenue in East Africa by £4,500 and Telephone revenue by £1500 (100% increase); Telegraph and Telephone revenue in Uganda by £1,100 altogether.

Total £47,780.

Head 7. Government Railways.

This Head shows an increase of no less than £300,000, of which £33,000 is to be derived from the Steamer service.

Head 7a. Busoga Railway.

The estimate for Coaching and Goods traffic as shewn in the Appendix to the Uganda Estimates is only

£17,676 instead of £22,500. The Uganda figure is later than that included in these Estimates which must be revised accordingly.

Head 7b. Busoga Marine.

On the other hand the later Uganda figure for Earnings on the Busoga Marine is £23,197 instead of £22,000.

The net deduction to be made on Heads 7a and 7b is, therefore, as stated in the covering despatch £3,507.

Head 8. Rents of Government property.

An increase of £7,166, of which £2,550 is on timber sales and royalties, £3136 on rent of lands other than Forest Areas. Rents of Forest areas drop by £400.

Head 9. Interest.

Total £5,600

Head 10. Miscellaneous Receipts.

Sale of stores increases by £1,000, but most noticeable is the 100% increase (£1,500) on Commission and sale of unclaimed and confiscated goods.

Head 11. Sale of Government property.

The sale of farm produce shows a decrease of £500. hitherto sale of serum etc. (see Head 4) has been included under this subhead. A sum £4000 appears as royalty

royalty on Magadi soda products. The Government may now expect to begin to reap the fruits of the Magadi Railway Scheme.

Total £8,000.

Head 12. Land Sales.

The revenue from this source is now divided up between sales and freehold and homestead areas (a trifling sum of £210) and stand premia on farms and town-plots (£10,900). The increase over the estimate for 1913-14 is £3,150. The Governor ~~will use all the revenue he will~~ utilises this revenue on special expenditure (under P.W. Extr.) for road construction or other development works, particularly for the opening up of new districts.

EXPENDITURE.

Head 1. Rent and Interest to Sultan of Zanzibar.

These payments were recently considered in connexion with the Zanzibar Estimates. There seems to be no likelihood of their being discontinued.

Head 2. Pensions.

See Appendix G.

1. The pension for Dr. H. A. Rödeker is £192.10^b, of which Uganda will pay £25 and the East Africa Protectorate £167.10^b: (File 1993/E.A.)

2. The pension of £8 for Mr. E. M. Knox was sanctioned in 1911 (C.O./34381/10), but has never hitherto been shown on the Estimates. The actual share of his pension from East Africa Protectorate funds is £5.2.8.

Head 3. Governor.

I had expected to find provision of £1,000 for stables at Government House, as the Governor was told last year that he might provide for this work in 1914-15. But apparently he has decided not to proceed with the scheme (Gov./13075/13).

Total £7 434.

Head 4. Secretariat.

Provision is made for an additional European Clerk (£150 by £10 to £200 with £40 house allowance) and for four probationary clerks (£192 for the four altogether). I think that we must watch carefully any tendency to add to the European clerical staff of the Protectorate, but one office Superintendent and 2 European clerks are probably not too many for the Secretariat, and I would not refuse to sanction this appointment. The probationary clerks will be non-European in training. For district stations etc., presumably, as though it is not clear, these clerks will fill posts already provided under Head 5 and ~~not~~ for so long as they are learning their work in the Secretariat, there will be a saving on the provision for the District Clerks under Head 6. We should not allow the Protectorate Government to add indirectly to the total

number of non-European clerks.

Heads 5 and 6a. "Official Gazette" and Printing.

£1,000 is included for a "Linotype with motor and heater complete". There is no doubt an ever-increasing amount of printing to be done, and I would approve the purchase of this machine, the advantages of which are set out in the Statement of Differences; but if it needs another European at £200 by £10 to £250 to work it, I am not at all ~~satisfied~~ ^{true that} it will "eventually prove economical". Salary for the Operator is allowed for 6 months only: if this means that a man is wanted for 6 months to get the machine in working order and train the local staff to run it, the objection as to recurrent expenditure vanishes; but it may be that they do not expect to get the machine out till about September. We should enquire as to this, asking how economy will be effected if recurrent expenditure of £225 at the mean is involved for the operator.

Heads 6 and 6a. Provincial Administration.

The increase in Administrative Staff is in accordance with the approval given in Treasury/24516/13, but as we propose to appoint the last batch of new Assistant District Commissioners, say twelve, during the financial year 1914-15, possibly six in May and six in September, it will not be necessary to provide the full salaries for the 77 Assistant District Commissioners. I believe that the Governor has taken this into account;

We cannot therefore effect any reduction on this subhead,
and we must be prepared for a substantial increase in
1915-16 when the whole establishment will have been
filled up.

2. Again, we have a new European Clerk, He is
wanted for Seyidie Province. We know that this Province
is now going ahead well under the energetic Provincial
Commissioner, Mr. Hobley, and I should be inclined to
approve of the appointment. At the same time there is a
large increase on the non-European clerical establishment -
17 appointments, in all - which means an annual increase
of £1,700 or so. We should draw attention to this and
enquire why there should be so large an addition to the
subordinate clerical staff.

3. The ration allowance of R 20 p.m. was
approved for all subordinate clerks with salaries less
than R 125 p.m. serving at Ngabotok (Treasury/30545/13).
This allowance is being extended to other out-of-the-way
parts of the Protectorate, and I do not think that we can

refuse

refuse to extend it to the Clerks in the N.P.D. generally, Serenli, etc.

4. The provision for Seyidie has been increased by nearly £2,000 on personal emoluments and over £1,000 on other charges. It is rather difficult to compare 1914-15 expenditure on this Province with that for 1913-14 owing to the re-casting of the Estimates, but all the individual appointments of Lwalis, Mudirs, Cadis, etc., are correct, and I find that the chief increases on the subordinate staff are for Presidents of Councils (£952), Tribal Retainers (£603), Station Hands (£204), Hut Counters (£400), Inspectors, Market Masters, Tax Collectors, Overseers etc., (£296). (The figures in brackets are the totals, not the increases). We might call attention to the increase on these subheads, particularly the Presidents of Councils (formerly Elders or Village Headmen) for whom in the 1913-14 Estimates I can only trace £293, and the Tribal Retainers for whom in the 1913-14 Estimates I can only trace £48.

5. The Mombasa Conservancy expenditure necessarily comes up, as explained in paragraph 8 of the covering despatch, and will no doubt increase in future years. Mr. Sanderson, the Superintendent, for whom ~~the Government~~ wants a salary of £400 by £20 to £500 instead of £300 by £20 to £400 (with salary at £420 from 1st April 1914) has, we know, done excellent work, and I would accept this recommendation. I notice that several minor appointments under this subhead have dropped out e.g. Gun Registrar (£106), Assistant Inspector of buildings (£86) Assistant Gun Registrar, one 5th grade Clerk, one 6th grade clerk and office boys? why, I do not know.

6. The Mombasa trolley line is threatened with abolition by the Governor, but for the present he retains provision as in Estimates for 1913-14.

7. The non-native police force correcting staff was sanctioned on Treasury/20844/13, but the total provision has risen from £409 to £517.

8. £50 for the Secretary of the Wakf Commission hitherto drawn by Mr. G. E. Powter (now retiring on pension) has disappeared from the Estimates.

9. Jubaland Province and the N. F. D. account for a large increase in expenditure—£4488 and £4,420 respectively, apart from an increase under Head 6a, special expenditure, of £1,947 and £2,930 respectively, which latter represent non-recurrent expenditure. These increases are the inevitable result of the more forward policy which has been adopted in the north and north-east of the Protectorate. Transport is the great problem in these districts and we must face the expense. The general scheme of transport was sanctioned on Treasury/28331/13, and a small beginning made during the current year. The expenditure approved on that paper was—

The Governor specially asked to be allowed to insert lump sums in these Estimates, so as not to be tied down to details—a very reasonable request in the circumstances.

These Estimates keep very closely to the

approved

Approved provision, but the N. F. D. recurrent expenditure is rather more than we anticipated: so now we get instead of a total of £5,939, £5,060 for "transport" under other charges plus at least £720 for the Transport and Assistant Transport Officers (total £6,380). Still, I do not think that we need Davis at this increase. Nor can we possibly refuse proper escorts for our Administrative Officers in these disturbed districts; but I cannot find that we did actually sanction 60 Armed Constabulary for Jubaland in Treasury/28/13/13 (quoted by the Treasurer) costing £720 per annum. I find that the Governor's estimate included the following Armed Constabulary:

We had already on the 1913-14 Estimates provision for 20 Armed Constabulary under N.F.D. now increased for this District by 25.

10. The Massai District now appears separate under Naivasha Province.

Head 7. Treasury.

1. The Treasurer asks for an additional Assistant Treasurer on the recognised scale to deal with the extra work. It seems reasonable that the work in all departments should increase, as the Protectorate grows, and I would accept the recommendation.

2. There are also increases in the subordinate clerical staff, one 3rd grade clerk, one 5th grade clerk,

3. The personal allowance of £20 for Mr. Adelphi Cashier, is, I think, deserved after 17 years' service with a maximum of £240 which he has now drawn for 3 years; but we might warn the Governor against recommending personal allowances if the grant of one is likely to lead to a flood of further applications.

Head B. Customs.

1. The change in titles of the 4 Baggage Examiners to that of Preventive Officers may be approved, but the salaries should not be raised to £150 by £10 to £250,

leaving a final settlement of the question of salaries for the European clerks. In this case, allowing 4 increments of £10 in the old scale £120 by £10 to £180 (none of the four having yet reached the maximum of that scale), there will be a reduction of £600 - ~~£600 x 2/3 = £400~~ - £70.

2. The uniform allowance (fair at £10 per annum) should be granted, as the Preventive Officers are to wear uniforms and I think they should.

Head C. 1st & 2nd Div. - Port and Marine.

1. The lighthouse at Kismayu provided for in 1913-14 but not built will not now be required, as the Italians have very kindly put up a lighthouse at Giumbo.

2. The mooring buoy for Mombasa must, I suppose, be allowed (~~£100~~)^{£100}; and the boat for Kismayu (£100) is clearly necessary. But I am not sure that a motor launch is needed at Mombasa; I should have thought that

the

the lights in the Harbour could be dealt with quite expeditiously enough by starting the row boats in good time on their round. However, we do not want to be too parsimonious, and as the launch should be of use for other purposes, perhaps it may be sanctioned.

3. £1,500 for a launch for the Tana River and £300 for improving the Tana waterway - will probably have to be allowed. This is an important district and the river is the natural line of communication with the interior. But I fear that it will mean an increase under Personal Emoluments for looking after the launch, a point ~~omitted~~ omitted by the Governor. In replying to these Estimates I would ask for a full list of the craft on the Tana River (there is provision for an Engineer, firemen, etc., in the 1913-14 Estimates, so there are clearly some craft already on the River) and the uses to which they put, saying that the provision for the new launch can stand in the Estimates for the present but that Secretary of State wishes first to be satisfied that none of the existing craft can perform the work which it is proposed that the new launch shall do and that their approval must be obtained, before the launch is ordered.

Head 10. Audit Department.

The provision is strictly in accord with the Director of Colonial Audit's Estimate sent to the Governor in M.I./34464/13.

Head 11. Legal Departments.

1. See Gov./40309/13 as to increase in staff

and

and emoluments. Provisional approval was given for the extra Magistrate (£400 by £20 to £500 + £40); the scale £400 by £20 to £500 + £40 for the Registrar of the High Court; and an additional Deputy Registrar who with the present Deputy should be on the scale £250 by £15 to £400. These additions should be finally approved and the provision in the draft Estimates amended, so that the salary for the Registrar will be £420, not £425; and the salary for the second deputy £250, not £300.

2. It would be desirable to have more information as to the expenditure of £800 (£500 in 1913-14) on "jurors, assessors, witnesses, etc.,". It seems a heavy payment for one year.

3. We should enquire as to the "ex-officio agent at Nairobi" of the Administrator General for whom a duty allowance of £25 is provided: who is this ex-officio agent?

4. In Gov./40760/13 we approved of the scale £400 by £20 to £500 + £40 for the Registrar of Documents at Nairobi, but the scale £250 by £15 to £400 has not yet been sanctioned for Mr. Pailthorpe and the new Registrar who replaced the Registrar of Documents, Nairobi (£200 by £10 to £300) and the European Clerk (£120 by £10 to £180). We have suggested that the scale finally approved for Office Superintendents now under consideration (the Governor wants £200 by £15 to £400) should suffice. At present Office Superintendents get £200 + £300 (£180-£270 if pensionable). Would it not be better to put these two salaries at £180 by £20 to £270

(pensionable)

(pensionable) for the present and the actual salaries £250 (allowing a £20 increment on the salary provided for Mr. Pailtherpe on the 1913-14 Estimates) and £150 respectively?

I regret that local Solicitors should have to be entrusted with land cases on the Coast, but I suppose it is inevitable. From what we have heard of local solicitors - there are two famous cases - I have a wholehearted distrust of them. ~~TOTAL/MAILED~~

Head 12. Police.

(1) There is a large increase on this Head £6,812 a very large part of which is for personal emoluments. I doubt the extension of administered areas and the growth of European settlement demand increased personnel in the Police force; but I am not quite satisfied that two more Assistant Superintendents at £250 by £15 to £400 will not do as well as one Superintendent at £400 by £20 to £500 and one Assistant Superintendent. We have 7 Superintendents, at present stationed at Mombasa, Nairobi (2) Kiambu, Nakuru and Kisimayu. The explanation in the Statement of Differences is not quite clear, because the addition of one Superintendent surely cannot allow for an extra Superintendent at Mombasa and also a Superintendent in Kisimayu. I would prefer to go slowly with the creation of these higher appointments and on these Estimates at any rate I would substitute an Assistant Superintendent for the Superintendent. The additions to the European Constables and to the African and Asiatic rank and file should I think, be approved.

(3)

(3) The 7 Sub-Inspectors are now started as pensionable in accordance with Gov/32337/13.

(4) I should much like to press for an improvement in the salary of the Commissioner of Police, Mr. Notley. In 1913-14 he drew £592 on the scale £600 by £25 to £600 with a duty allowance of £80, so that in 1914-15 he will only have an increment of £5. Mr. Notley is the model Police Officer; he has been consistently praised by men so unlike as Sir P. Girouard, Sir H. Belfield and Major Edwards; and his responsibilities are increasing. Hitherto it has been maintained - the Tropical African Services Committee was, I understand, responsible for the view - that no increase in the emoluments of the Commissioners of Police in East Africa and Uganda should be approved until the Inspector General of Police was dispensed with. Consequently Mr. Notley is on the scale £500-£600 + £80 and Captain Riddick (in Uganda) on the scale £400-£500 + £40. We can dismiss Uganda from consideration for the moment on financial grounds and also because Captain Riddick, although efficient, is not an officer of outstanding merit like Mr. Notley. There appears to be no immediate prospect of a transfer for Major Edwards, and when we have the power (as we now are in the East Africa Protectorate) to reward a really meritorious officer, we should do so. I would at once make the scale for the Commissioner in East Africa Protectorate £500 by £25 to £700 + £80 duty pay and let Mr. Notley enter this scale at £550. In 1913-14 he drew

£592 + £80 = £672; if he enters the new scale at £592, he will draw altogether in 1914-15 £700. Any complaint from the Assistant Commissioner as to the reduction in the duty allowance can be met by pointing to the same difficulty in all other departments where the Second in Command receives a duty allowance which he relinquishes when acting for the Head of the Department, thus gaining very little for ~~one~~ extra work.

It may be that through having made rather a hobby of the Police, I am inclined to be partial towards that Department, but I know that Mr. Notley deserves any recognition of his services which can be given and I hope you will agree to this proposal. We should of course explain that this is done as a reward for exceptional good work and when the post of Inspector General Police is abolished, no further increase in the emoluments of the Commissioner will be made.

Heads 13 and 15A. Prisons.

(1) During the course of the year 1873, a new Prison Ordinance was considered and approved generally by the Secretary of State (Govt/1873/12/13 and subsequent numbers). This Ordinance allows for a Commissioner of Prisons, the Prisons Board being abolished, and an Assistant Commissioner; also Superintendents and Deputy Superintendents of Prisons as well as the usual Gaolers, Matrons, Warders and Wardresses. The posts of Commissioner and

and Assistant Commissioner are included in these Estimates, but no ~~actual~~ provision of salary made, because the Governor considers that Major Edwards as Inspector General of Prisons can fulfil the duties of the Commissioner in return for which he will continue to draw a duty allowance of £60 (of which is paid by Uganda) and in lieu of an Assistant Commissioner he retains temporarily the post of Inspector of Prisons now held by Mr. T.A. Gray who, I agree, should become Assistant Commissioner in due course and combine with that post the work of Superintendent of the Nairobi Prison. The only criticism I would offer is that £560 - £500 + £50 for the Commissioner is perhaps excessive and I should be inclined to fix the Commissioner's salary, at present shown on the Estimates but not actually provided for, at £400 by £20 to £500 + £40.

(2) I would agree to the creation of the post of Superintendent of the Mombasa Prison at £250 by £15 to £400 with £25 duty allowance and to the appointment of Mr. S.B. Hall, awaiting date on 1st August 1914, as this man, when the Mombasa will be required in 1914-15.

Observations in the last part of paragraph 14 of his despatch as to reliefing of the Commissioners at Nairobi and Mombasa of the superintendence of the two big prisons in those towns.

(4) Taking together the Prisons and Prisons Special Expenditure, the increase in 1914-15 is only £2488, not £4873; the Governor has absorbed, quite properly, in the Prisons expenditure the "special expenditure" provided in 1913-14 for Nairobi Prison, by which is really meant the expenditure on the Thika Railway prison camp (the Thika Railway was built by prison labour).

Total £18,222.

Heads 14 and 14A Medical Department.

(1) You will see that there is apparently an enormous increase on this Head viz: £29,739; but £17,189 of this is due to the incorporation of Hospitals and Dispensaries, hitherto a separate Head. I do not know why they should have decided to do this: Uganda keeps them distinct; Nyasaland puts them together. I do not think we need make any comment on the new arrangement.

(2) A European clerk is said to be needed for the Deputy Principal Medical Officer's Office. The Principal Medical Officer has two European clerks and the Deputy Medical Officer none; but I would ask for further information as to the quantity and nature of the clerical work before giving final approval to this. Meanwhile, it might be provisionally set down in the Estimates. I would deal in the same way with the European Clerk for the Chief Sanitation Officer.

(3) It is proposed to increase the permanent medical staff by three, for service at Eldoret (quite necessary), Kumiess (not necessary if, as I believe,

Professor Simpson condemns this station, but presumably necessary for the substituted station, wherever it may be) and for Nairobi (Lunatic Asylum and Cnol). I think that we must have these men, but presumably the Governor will select three of the six temporary medical officers who have been sent out for plague work, for whom oddly enough no provision seems to be included at all, unless it is concealed in some lump sum, which seems improbable. We should enquire whether this will enable him to take on three of the plague doctors and to dispense with their services of special plague work - and if so what will become of those temporary medical officers not thus disposed of. There will be three apparently unprovided for, unless they are still required in Mombasa - in which case why is no provision made for them on the Estimates?

(4) The duty allowance of £20 to Sister in charge of the Mombasa European hospital should be approved.

(5) The various increases in subordinate medical staff, Assistant Surgeons and Sub-Assistant Surgeons under the Medical and Sanitation Divisions must, I think, be allowed.

(6) The Governor wants an Assistant Health Officer and Pathologist (presumably it would be permanent and pensionable post) at £400 by £20 to £500, who will act as port surgeon at Mombasa under the Medical Officer of Health, take charge of the laboratory and perform the duties of pathologist. Possibly, he would be at

absorb one of the supernumerary temporary medical officers in this port, if approved, as I think it should be.

This application was recommended by Professor

Simpson in Govt/27674/13.

(7) The Governor asks now for 4 Sanitary Inspectors instead of 4. This was the original demand which we cut down for the time being. The Sanitary Inspectors seem to be doing well and doubtless Mombasa and Nairobi need more than one each.

(8) The Clayton disinfecter necessitates a staff costing £100 per annum to keep it going. The disinfecter has already been purchased in connexion with plague measures, but a steel barge is now required at £600 for use when the disinfecter is dealing with vessels.

(9) There seem to be numerous increases in connexion with "Quarantine Stations" and "Infectious Diseases Hospitals." I think that we might well ask for more detail as to what exactly is being done.

(10) It is proposed to call Mr. P. Ross (a most valuable officer), Director of Laboratories instead of Bacteriologist and to make the scale £600 by £25 to £700 instead of £600 fixed. We must be prepared to pay a good expert a good salary and I would agree, but I would say that if and when a vacancy occurs Secretary of State will have to consider the question of making the scale £500 by £25 to £700.

(11) Besides the Assistant Health Officer and Pathologist at Mombasa, the Governor wants a

Pathologist

Pathologist and Assistant Bacteriologist to help Mr. Ross (£400 by £20 to £500 - presumably a permanent and pensionable post like that held by Mr. Ross).
 Perhaps in this post he would absorb another of the Supernumerary Temporary Medical Officers. I believe the work in the Laboratory has increased enormously; and moreover, there is the difficulty of carrying on when Mr. Ross is away. I think that we might agree to the appointment. I assume that in the case of this appointment and that of the Mombasa Assistant Health Officer and Pathologist, both of which carry a salary of £400 by £20 to £500, the usual rule as to probation for Medical Officers for 3 years at £400 will hold.

(12). The provision for epidemics under other Charges, Sanitation Division, is wisely increased from £500 to £2000.

Total £57,455.

Head 15. Hospitals and Dispensaries.

See under Head 14.

Total £11.

Head 16. Education.

(1) An extra Assistant Master for the Nairobi Arabic School at the normal salary (£200 by £10 to £250 - pensionable) is provided for. This post appears to be necessary, but the difficulty will be to obtain a master worth having at the price.

(2) The Headmastership of the Mombasa Division C School (Arabs) is now vacant owing to the dismissal of Mr. Pipe. We have been peculiarly unfortunate with this School, where, as Sir P. Girouard pointed out,

wanted above all things, a "gentle air"; we succeeded only in getting a drunkard at £250 by £15 to £400 with £50 duty allowance. As a new man will be required the initial salary only need be provided.

(3) The establishment of a School in N.Kavirendo £555 for staff allowed in these Estimates, but probably £700 or £800 will be required in 1915-16) is probably justified; apparently the education will be largely technical, which is just what is wanted in such a district; but I think that we might ask for more information as to the proposed Magadi School for which a "grant" of £100 is inserted. You will see that £500 is provided under Other Charges for the upkeep and purchase of materials for the N.Kavirendo School; this too will be a recurrent charge, but presumably the amount will be less, say £300, in future years.

Total £9467.

Heads 17 and 17A. Transport.

(1) The Assistant at Nairobi, Mr. J.H. Moon, may properly, I think, be made permanent and pensionable; but if, as might well be the case, the Assistant Director's salary is fixed at £250 by £15 to £400 when Mr. G. G. vacates the post, it would be better to have £250 as the maximum for the Assistant at Nairobi. For the present at any rate I would prefer to make the salary £150 by £10 to £250.

(2) The personal allowance of £12 for Mr. Barros is deserved.

(2)

(3) I notice that the East Africa and Uganda Estimates do not quite agree, where the charges are "halved". Thus, under head 18, Uganda Estimates 1914-15, £94 is allowed for Uganda share of salary of 1st Grade Clerk at £188; but East Africa inserts only £88 giving the salary as Rs.1300 - £80. This should be pointed out and the necessary adjustments to these estimates.

(4) It may be mentioned that Uganda is providing the Coast Agent with a new 4th Grade Clerk paid entirely from Uganda funds.

(5) Surely £120 is rather excessive for upkeep of the old motor car, as £100 is provided separately for the Chauffeur.

(6) £200 is provided as "Special Expenditure" for a motor boat. Cf. provision under Head 9 A. I should have thought that one motor boat would meet the needs of the situation for both departments for the present. I am inclined to delete provision for the one boat, and say that the Transport Department should be given first call on the services of the boat. Perhaps, in these circumstances, it would be better to provide £100 under Head 9 A and £100 under Head 17A for the purchase Total £4040.

Heads 18 and 18A Military.

(1) The Inspection Report referred to in the Statement of Differences is the document in which the creation of the appointment of Quartermaster is urged as absolutely necessary, does not appear to be in our possession; presumably we shall receive the Inspector General's

is valid.

General's Inspection Report (including this recommendation) in due course, with so large a force as we now have in the East Africa Protectorate, a Quartermaster is required, especially now that we have a considerable force stationed in the N.E. of the Protectorate. I have spoken to Major Brough who fully agrees as to the need for making the appointment. As to salary, £400 + £48, he tells me that a Quartermaster should have the same rate of pay as a Company Commander (£400 + £48); inter alia, if a smaller salary is given, the man is always on the lookout for a transfer to a Company Commander's billet, where he gets more entertaining as well as (in that case) better-paid work. We shall probably get an Army Service Corps Officer - young, unmarried and energetic - for the post.

(2) £300 is included on £70 as good conduct pay; it is said that this was formerly shown under Other Charges: there is no such sumhead under Other Charges in 1913-14 Estimates, but the Good Conduct pay was included in £450 for "Gratuities".

(3) The large increase of £900 on transport of stores (p. 71) is exclusive of fixed transport on the Juba.

(4) The extension of our activities in the N.E. of the Protectorate necessitates increases of all kinds and we cannot avoid them. Thus, the vote for upkeep of buildings (p. 72) goes up from £150 to £1500, because £1000 will be required for Gobwen and Yonde alone. We must take the word of the Treasurer that this is really for upkeep and not for new buildings, although it seems to be a heavy item. However, we have heard before from

Colonel Thessiger that much wanted doing at these places.

(5) I notice that pay for the 8 subalterns of the 4 Companies of the 1st Battalion reported £850. To pay our Subalterns in the King's African Rifles (a) if of six years service £350; (b) if of three years and less than six years' service £325; (c) if of less than three years service £300. If any of the subalterns happen to fall in class (b) or (c), the local Government will doubtless see that the proper salary is paid, even though £350 is provided.

(6) East Africa Protectorate has provided, quite correctly, for a payment to Nyasaland for the "depot company" (£1600), and the additional expenditure incurred by Nyasaland (£588) for providing the 1st Battalion troops in which Nyasaland (so to speak) is not interested. But as to the £1600: the despatch of July (W.O./18181/13) about the depot company has been superseded by the arrangement approved on 13th November (I.G./36184/13) as from 1st April 1914. That arrangement, as explained in I.A.G./36373/13, really came to this: the depot company idea was crushed out of existence and a new Company approved in its place. £1600 will not suffice to cover the upkeep of the new Company (apart from reliefs for which, I see, £2000 is provided on p.73). I confess that I find O.A.G./36373/13 (enclosures) rather bewildering and I am not clear what sum exactly should be provided. Colonel

Baldwin states that his figure means only an increase in cost of about £150 (p. 9.), so that the cost of the new company should be

This excludes transport, which I assume to be included in the £2900 referred to above.

Seeing that in the figure £1784 is included initial expenditure, the annual cost should be less than £1784 after 1914-5.

I would refer to our despatch No. 975 of 13th November on I.G./38184/13 in replying, and observe that some extra provision will presumably be necessary, in round figures, say £200.

(7) From Gov/21521/13 (with Prov Adm. instruction handle: Jubaland transport etc), we expected the increase in recurrent expenditure on General Military Transport to be about £95. The increase is actually £1248. This, apparently at largely due to an addition of 45 to the number of drivers instead of an addition of only 19, and they seem to have increased the vote for stores, saddlery etc (now lumped together) by about £100. But we cannot attempt to criticise in great detail or to cut down an estimate for special trans-

port

transport of this kind, when the whole organisation is really only just being worked out.

(8) It is satisfactory to see that the Volunteer capitation grant of £1 a man rises from 350 to 500. We shall soon have a decent Volunteer force in East Africa available for emergencies, if the conditions of the Protectorate allow of their being mobilized with reasonable rapidity.

(9) Under special military expenditure, I had to see £1060 for two officers' houses at Serenil and £500 for draining the military lines at Taita. But as to £1,200 for equipment of mule corps we have just heard from the Governor (Gov/2949/14) that it is very difficult to get horses in that part of the country i.e. Serenil - and that if imported, a large number would probably be lost between Mombasa and Serenil and that there is a possibility of fostering mule breeding in the northern part of the Protectorate. They may, therefore, find themselves unable to get the mules even for one company.

Total £77,445.

Head 15. Miscellaneous Services

Since the Estimate was drafted, the Governor has written in (Gov./2946/24) asking contribution to the Tropical Diseases Research Fund. He asked East Africa Protectorate, among other Colonial Governments, to contribute, now that it is self-sufficient to this fund. £200 was suggested. The Governor stated that he hopes to find £200 savings on the Estimates, but had better insert the necessary contribution here.
Total £7,975.

Heads 20 & 20A.

Heads 20 and 20A, Post Office and Telegraphs.

(1) We may receive an application for an increase in the Postmaster-General's emoluments (see Gov./35651/13), but so far as the Estimates are concerned no change has been made.

(2) A duty allowance of £60 is included for Mr. L. E. Caine, the Deputy Postmaster-General, on the strength of Gov./35651/13, and it is pleasantly asserted that one-half will be payable by Uganda, altho' no such provision has been made in the Uganda Estimate for 1915-16.

Mr. Caine has had 26 years' service in East Africa, and has recently been well reported on by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate: but you should read the minutes on Gov./35651/13. In any case I should prefer a duty allowance of £40 on the assumption that the proper scale of salary for this post is £400 by £20 to £500. We are waiting for the Governor's recommendation and possibly this provision may be taken as his final recommendation, but we ought to have a proper despatch. Inasmuch as Uganda is concerned, and we shall have to go to the Treasury, apart from other considerations, I am inclined to defer any provision for a duty or personal allowance for Mr. Caine till 1915-16.

(3) The petition for the proposed Assistant Postmaster General is correctly included in the East Africa Protectorate Estimates (as distinct from the Assistant Telegraph Engineer (originally combined with the former post) who is provided for on the Uganda Estimates. The separation of the posts was approved in Gov./34666/12 Uganda.

(4)

(4) As regards the 7 Postal Clerks and Telegraphists at £150 by £8 to £160, it has been recently decided not to improve this scale. (Gov/3963/14).

(5) As to Asiatic staff, the Postmaster General (Gov/19227/12) is sending a postal official to try to recruit suitable men. The numbers of the 3rd grade Sub-Postmasterships goes up from 26 to 32 and the 4th grade from 52 to 73. That we actually approved on Treasury 21639/13 was additional expenditure of £1,800 in 1914. It without fixing the numbers, although we did approve of 36 new appointments in 1913-14, 15 of which were Europeans. (Treasury/21639/13). The total provision for 6 new 3rd grade clerks at R.1500 and 21 new 4th grade clerks at R.960 rather exceeds £1,800, but the difference may be due to increments for those already appointed in 1913-14; and the point is not worth raising.

(6) The duty allowance of £35 for the Telegraph Engineer (Mr. Creighton) was approved on Gov./35650/13 subject to Governor's concurrence or rather that is what the minutes directed, although they were not carried out fully and we merely said we would await the Governor's recommendation. This recommendation has now been received (Gov./4524/14).

(7) I agree that one good Indian 3rd class Telegraph Inspector should have increments of R.120 instead of R.60. This should be indicated in the Estimates as well as the Statement of Differences.

(8) The vote for repairs and renewals goes up to £700 (£200 increase). It is a question how far wooden pole lines are really economical in East Africa: it is said that "several of old wooden pole lines require extensive renovation".

(9) The local Government vainly expects that the Wireless station will be completed at Somach in 1913-14. It is of course scandalous that it was not completed long since, but the Marconi trouble and then the squabble between the Marconi and the Anglo French Companies have intervened. Presumably the £500 from 1913-14 will be available next year as a "lapsed service".

(10) The demand for new telephones accounts for a large increase of expenditure under Head 20 A, notably £1,300 increase for Nairobi and Mombasa. The necessity of telegraph extensions and improvements on the "asain Bishu plateau and district also means £1,800 special expenditure. Still we cannot, obviously, refuse to entertain development expenditure of this kind, although heavy.

(11) I am not clear as to the £2,000 for "new telegraph lines connecting Imperial wireless Station". Surely if this expenditure is necessitated by the Imperial Wireless Scheme, it should be met from Imperial funds. I would ask for further explanation as to what is intended and how far the re-alignment etc., referred to would be necessary apart from the Imperial "Wireless" scheme; but allow for the present state of the Estimate.

(12) I find no reference in these Estimates to an unallocated stores account for Telegraph and telephone material foreshadowed on Nov 4 1913. It is a most reasonable proposal and should be adopted. £5,000 was suggested as the sum for these unallocated stores. He should refer to this in replying and ask whether the Governor wishes to drop the scheme, as he does not mention it,

it, saying that to Secretary of State it appears to be a most reasonable suggestion.

Head 21. Railway Department.

(See Appendix E)

In connexion with the Railway Estimates, see especially Gov./43542/13 and ^{previous} papers on which has been discussed the question of salaries for the Superior Railway Staff in 1914-15. The general principle of definite rates of increment has been accepted on that paper and the schedules in appendix E of the Estimates will need revision.

Abstract A.

- (1) 1. Chief Engineer - £700 by £25 to £900 + £70
- 3. District Engineers - £600 by £25 to £700 + £50
- 7. Assistant Engineers £300 by £20 to £550.

These numbers are in accord with Gov/43542/13 and previous papers and it is now clear that an Assistant Engineer is to be substituted for the Sub-Engineer (£400 - £450).

~~Recalculations~~. The General Manager still leaves the scale of salary for a Sub-Engineer at foot of page (2): this should be deleted.

The salary for Mr. Griess, District Engineer, will be £650, not £675, because he is getting a duty allowance: that for Mr. Hunter £525 instead of £500, for the same reason: that for Mr. Bunbury, Mr. Atkinson and Mr. McJannet £5 less each because we are cutting down the increment from £25 to £20 that for Mr. Hyatt will not be reduced from £500 to £475 as contemplated on Gov/43542/13, as he is promoted to District Engineer at £500 initial salary and the Busoga Railway appointment goes to Mr. R.J.C. Grant Davie (see later).

(2) The other increases under A I (b) and A I (c) are necessary for general increase of staff to cope with work.

(3) Under A IV £15,000 is provided for Staff Quarters as compared with £3,600 in 1913-14 revised to £6,600 in the revised Railway Estimates 1913-14. On Gov/1959/13/14 it was explained that the extra £3,000 in the revised Estimates 1913-14 for the erection of quarters to take the place of two rows of houses fronting Government Road in Nairobi which are too old for repair. In the innocence of our hearts we have asked the Governor whether £3,000 would suffice for the work.

The £15,000 inserted in these Estimates is the quiet but effective reply to our enquiry. I would ask for more information as to total expenditure anticipated on this subhead (there may be more required yet). It is difficult to get proper explanations out of the Railway Department.

(4) Under A V the vote for minor works is £12,000 of £9,000 in 1913-14 Estimates revised to £11,400, of which we now know from Gov/1959/13/14 £3250 is as yet unallocated. I would insist upon the General Manager furnishing details of the proposed expenditure.

Abstracts B and C.

(1) The superior appointments and salaries need revision in accordance with Gov/43542/13:

- 1 Chief Mechanical Engineer - £700 by £25 to £725 + £20
- 1 Assistant £500 by £25 to £600
- 1 Workshop Superintendent £350 by £20 to £350
- 2 Assistants £350 by £20 to £350

The salaries for Mr. Hartnell and Mr. Ford should be reduced by £5 each, as the increment is being cut down here from £25 to £20.

(2) We are to expect an increase in establishment of one Assistant in 1915-16.

(3) Inevitable increases on subordinate staff occur throughout - note especially under B and C II. Overtime and trip allowances £11,800 cl. £7,200 in 1913-14. Estimates revised to £8,950.

(4) Note under B and C IV an increase of £26,000 on fuel; but see also footnote on page 5 which ~~estimates~~^{shows} the enormous increase in train mileage.

(5) Note under B and C VII £79,902 for maintenance and renewal of engines and rolling stock (£36,000 of which is for wages). This is an increase of £43,262 over 1913-14. Estimates revised to £57,140. Surely we might have a statement of exactly what the Railway Department hope to do with all this money. I do not suggest that it is not needed, but I do protest against the way in which the Uganda Railway department regards itself as ~~an independent body~~ which merely does what it likes, demanding large sums of money without furnishing details unless pressed for them.

Abstract D.

(1) The superior appointments and salaries need revision in accordance with Decr/4354/13.

1. Traffic Manager - £700 cl. £20 to £900 + £70.

1. Deputy ~~Manager~~ - £650 + £70.

5. Assistant Traffic Managers - £300 cl. £20 to £36.

I do not understand why no provision has been made for increments of £10 to Mr. French, Mr. Comett and Mr. Harrison, the Assistant Traffic Managers. I would call attention to the omission and say that if for any reason increments are to be withheld from these three officers, the provision of £60 now added can be utilised as savings, if required, for other purposes.

(2) Notice particularly under D I (a) £32,961 as against £22,630 in 1913-14 Estimates revised to £28,936. The increase is due (we do not know to what extent) to the substitution of European station masters for Indians "to be able to deal with the requirements of European residents". There are times when one does not feel ~~any~~ too much inclined to humour the white unofficial element in East Africa, but we cannot shut our eyes to the racial feeling which exists and always will exist between the white man and his brown "brother". In the Postal service, there is the same tendency to replace Indians by whites. On the whole, it may not be unreasonable to eliminate the Indian station masters and keep in similar positions the fewer Indians. There are, one has to say, friction between the whites and the crowds, in which of course the whites ~~will~~ win.

Australia

(1) The superannuation appointments and salaries need revision in accordance with Gov./47542/13:

1. General Cashier - £1,500 by £50 to £1,800 + £150

1. Assistant to Cashier - £300 by £10 to £550 + £50

1. Chief Accountant - £700 by £15 to £900 + £70.

2 Assistant Accountants - £300 by £10 to £550.

1. Chief Storekeeper - £600 + £60.

1. Assistant Storekeepers - £450 + £60.

N.B. The footnote on page 10 which gives these scales (without increments) is dangerously inaccurate, e.g. Chief Storekeeper - £500 - £700 + £60. Assistant Storekeepers £300 - £450. Although such scales might not be considered unreasonable, as compared with other approved scales in Railway Department, they have not been submitted for consideration in Gov./56260/13, so far as I can see, and

should

should not be allowed to go unquestioned: besides if the Chief Storeskeeper's scale were £600 - £700, the duty allowance should be £50, not £50. This should be referred to specifically in replying and an explanation asked for.

The salaries for Mr. Sweenie, Mr. Goodship and Mr. Kershaw should each be reduced by £5, as £20 increments are being substituted for £25 increments; but on the principle that a special duty allowance is being attached to Mr. Sweenie's post, this officer should have no increment.

(2) We are hoping to arrange for Mr. H.F. Wood, the Clerk provided for under Home Charges, to join the Railway Provident Fund.

(3) The Crown Agents will do well out of the Uganda Railway next year. See E.I.

(4) European clerks are being largely introduced - see E II (b) - to replace Indian clerks.

(5) Personal allowance for the Office Superintendent under E II c. (Mr. Martelli) was approved on Treas./33516/11; also personal allowance for the Sub-Storekeeper under E II b. (Mr. Bland) in Gov. 35290/13. But I see no provision for personal allowances approved on Treas./33516/11 for Mr. Miller (Head Accountant) and Mr. Herne (Permanent way Inspector). The allowance to the Flotilla Foreman also approved in Gov. 35290/13 is shown under f I a. If Mr. Miller and Mr. Herne are ~~still in the Permanent Service~~ the allowances should be shown. We should ask as to this.

(6) Under E VIII £2,000 is included for Advertising - c.f. £1,200 in 1913-14 increased to £1,800 in the revised Railway Estimates for that year. Mr. Longworth now gets £300 for himself; his rent is paid by the Government; and he has an assistant (Mr. Stobbs.).

Abstract F.

(1) The superior appointments and salaries need revision in accordance with Gov./43542:-

1 Marine Superintendent - £600 by £25 to £750 + £60.

1 Superintending Engineer - £500 by £25 to £700 + £50.

1 Deputy Superintending Engineer - £400 by £20 to £560
+ £40.

5 Commanders £360 by £20 to £500 + £36.

5 Chief Officers - £300 by £15 to £360.

10 Second Officers - £240 by £10 to £280.

5 Chief Engineers - £300 by £15 to £400 + £30.

8 Second Engineers - £200 by £10 to £260.

N.B. The last five scales are correctly shown in footnote on page 11. Here provision is made only for Uganda Railway Marine: the establishment in the enclosure to Gov./35280/13 includes Busoga Marine.

The question of salary for the second Engineer is still under consideration, and may have to be raised.

The figure "7" in column 2 opposite "Second Engineers" should be "8". *Memorandum dated 1st Oct. 1914. It is understood to 7 in footnote. See D.P.D. 1914, 9/1/4.*

(2) We have already authorised Crown Agents to fill up the post of Deputy Superintending Engineer, in anticipation of the approval of the Estimates (Gov./43628/13).

(3) Again, one would like to have some information as to the new minor works, F.VI, for which £6,065 is provided - an excess of £4,565 over the original 1913-14 vote.

Abstract G.

It is interesting to see that the Provident Fund means an expenditure of £10,000 per annum.

Head 21 A. Railway Special Expenditure.

£27,000

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£27,000 as compared with £5,000 in 1913-14 revised to £10,000. (a) The Nasin Gishu Survey costs £3,000: this presumably allows for a regular survey party of 4 engineers from England with Indian surveyors and draftsmen as in Gov./3989/14; but on that paper we have asked Governor if an officer cannot be detailed at once for reconnaissance, so as to save time. Provisionally, the £3,000 may be allowed to stand. (b) General engineering works account for £15,000, but we should have some information as to what works are wanted. (c) £2,000 is provided for furniture in accordance with our instructions in Gov./27566/13 only part of the total cost for supplying the railway staff with furniture in their quarters (£3,500) is inserted. (d) £5,000 is allowed for the Kairico-Thika Railway (Tramway) which is now incorporated with the Uganda Railway in accordance with the approval given in Gov./36112/13. We were told on that paper that (in September when Mr. Eastwood was writing) there was absolutely no equipment for this line. I think that we should ask for information as to the equipment of the line and the allocation of the £5,000 included in this Schedule.

Total £27,000.

Heads 21 B. & C. Busoga Railway and Marine.

(1) These have been examined in detail in the Estimates - see last page of printed memorandum annexed.

Mr. Grant Davis's salary is to be reduced by £5 (Abstract B.)
[not affected]
I note that the cadre for the Marine Section which was contemplated in Gov./35280/13 is not allowed for. There should have been at least another Chief Officer (assuming that the Commander is substituted for one Chief Officer).

and

and two Second Officers. I assumed that these would be included in the Uganda Railway Estimates, when I was minuting the Uganda Estimates. We should enquire as to this.

(2) The Extraordinary Expenditure has been reduced from £10,000 to £2,000 on the Uganda Estimates (Head 22.)

(3) The figures under heads 21 B and 21 C of the balance payable to Uganda are wrong. The balance payable is £8086 - see Working and maintenance Estimates of Busoga Railway - to which must be added the £5 saved on Mr. Grant Devie's salary: total £8,091. c.f. Uganda Estimates Revenue Head 4, where this is correctly shown. But in East Africa Protectorate Estimates we get a total balance of £6237 (Railway) plus £5,036 (Marine) = £11,273. Probably the East Africa Protectorate Estimate was drawn up before they realised that the Busoga Marine would not be so profitable as expected: at the same time, they might have made the figures in 21 B. and 21 C. square with the Busoga Railway Appendix. The total expenditure for Railway and Marine should be £33,132 (not divisible here, as General Charges and Special Expenditure have to be shared between the two and we do not know in what proportion), and the gross earnings £41,223 instead of those which appear on page 83. Assuming that except for the odd £5, all the figures in 21 B. are correct (the first three certainly are), schedule 21 C. will read:-

Head 21 (a) Thika Railway.

This head now disappears since this branch is incorporated

incorporated with the Uganda Railway.

With regard to Railway Expenditure, I cannot trace any provision for improved leave regulations as contemplated on Gov./~~G~~72/13-14. But such provision might quite well be concealed in a number of small sub-heads.

H. J. A.
It is suggested that the improved leave rules would mean an expenditure of £4,000 approximately every year. I think that we should refer to this in replying on these Estimates, say that Secretary of State ~~s~~ ~~gathers~~ that the necessary provision has not been included in the draft Estimates - that he agrees that the proposal is reasonable provided that the special acting allowances disappear, and that the Governor is at liberty to make provision in the revised Estimates accordingly, if he is prepared to reduce other expenditure by the same amount.

Heads 22 and 22 A. Agricultural Department

(1) The Agricultural Journal is a fair-sized publication and the editing of it must mean a good deal of work. But we might ask who is going to draw the proposed allowance: if, for instance, it were Mr. McDonald himself, who has £1,600 per annum, I would be inclined to refuse.

(2) I would agree to a duty allowance to Mr. Powell Chief of the Economic Plants Division. He has held his present appointment since April 1907.

00 (7) M
(3) After all Mr. Trench, the Coffee Plant Inspector, had to be engaged at £400 per annum. (File 5494 E.A.) The salary should be shown accordingly.

(4) An Agricultural Instructor for the Coast region would

would be of considerable assistance, if we can really get the proper man. It is difficult to say what salary should be offered - £350 by £15 to £400 is suggested in these Estimates. This scale might be allowed to stand provisionally, but we should consult the Director of Kew Gardens as to the salary as well as the occupant of this new post.

(5) I dislike the increment of £25 for the scale £350 to £450 proposed for the General Manager of the Naivasha Stock Farm. Mr. MacGregor has only held this post since April 1910, and his whole service dates from June 1908. True, his increments were £25 in scale £350 to £400, but if we now raise the maximum to £450 I would make the increment £15 or at ~~most~~ £20.

(6) The Uasin Gishu is a 'comin' district and I would agree to the Governor's recommendation that an experimental farm be started on the plateau; but again £25 is the wrong increment for the scale £350 to £400: it should be £15.

(7) The duty allowance for Mr. Anderson, the Government Entomologist, should be removed. We are asking the Treasury to grant a duty allowance for Mr. Gowdy, the Government Entomologist in Uganda. Moreover, in East Africa Protectorate there is now an Assistant who will draw the allowance while Mr. Anderson is on leave.

(8) I do not quite follow the Treasurer's explanation as to the Plant Import Inspector (Entomological Division, Personal Emoluments). We may mean simply that Mr. Sharpe who holds this post will fill the better paid Agricultural Instructor's appointment and so leave this post

post vacant. But will they get a really experienced man, such as they want, for the extra money? They are not easy to come by, these agricultural experts. 76

(9) If the local Government can find a fourth European Laboratory Assistant for the Pathological

District; I would let them do so: the difficulty is that we cannot get them here.

(10) The "Mechanic" for whom £180 is provided is to look after the steam and electricity plant which was purchased in 1913 at cost of £1,275. This was never mentioned when we were considering the purchase of the plant; and I doubt whether we shall get the man we want for this salary. In any case, I expect we must give increments.

(11) There was a suggestion that the Veterinary Department should be separated from the Agricultural Department, but Sir S. Stockman was consulted and the Governor has now been informed that the Secretary of State is not disposed to agree to this solution of the difficulties which led to the suggestion being put forward.

(12) Mr. Brandt, Deputy Chief Veterinary Officer has been transferred to Nigeria. His successor will be one of the Veterinary Officers who are now on the scale £400 to £500, so the minimum salary for the Deputy Chief Veterinary Officer will suffice for 1914-15, viz: £20.

(13) Mr. Sterdy wanted 7 new Veterinary Officers, making 7 permanent and 10 temporary; but the Governor has cut this down to 4 new appointments at £400. The stock industry of the Protectorate is growing rapidly and

we must provide more staff; besides, crises occur in Uganda which necessitate the loan of an East African Veterinary Officer. There is, however, always the difficulty of finding good candidates; and I fancy that Mr. Downie will have more than he can do in making 4 new appointments to East Africa, in addition to the demands of Uganda and Zanzibar.

(14) I do not like the increase in the European Clerical staff for the Agricultural Department, but one does not feel able to say that it is unnecessary - But I would enquire as to the possibility of using Indian or native clerks before finally sanctioning the appointments of the new clerks for the Pathological and Veterinary divisions.

(15) The compulsory dipping scheme, for which £3,000 has been provided under Head 22 A as a beginning, is dealt with in Gov./35289/13, and since that despatch was written the Uasin Gishu community has come into line. We are waiting for certain information from the Governor, but we definitely told him on S./37841/12 that there was no objection to his inserting £3,000 in these Estimates. The total expenditure of the scheme is estimated at £12,000, of which £3,400 will be recurrent, but there will be revenue from the scheme in the form of dipping fees (6/- per head for horses and large stock, 5/- per head for sheep and goats). If the Government succeeds in thus stamping out East Coast fever and tick-borne diseases, the money will have been admirably spent.

Head 23

Head 23 Forest Department.

(1) The Governor presses for reconsideration of the decision on No: 9 in file 3936 E.A. i.e. that Mr. W.B. Jackson should be appointed Deputy Conservator of Forests at £400 by £15 to £500 rather than the concession which we were disposed to make, viz: £300 by £15 to £400. Barring the strong appeal, I do not see that the Governor adds to the case as set out in Mr. Battiscombe's letter of 16th July; but perhaps they feel as keenly over this increase as we do over the Somaliland salaries which the Treasury are ~~about~~ to reconsider. Personally, I am willing to yield to the Governor as to salary, but I should prefer to call the post Senior Assistant Conservator.

(2) The new Assistant will be appointed on £250 and the post should be pensionable as shown in the Estimates.

(3) If the three new Foresters' appointments are approved, we must see that we fill them from the sources to which the Conservator agrees.

Total £11,892.

Head 24. Game Department.

(1) The Warden's appointment should be permanent and pensionable in accordance with the decision in Colonial Office despatch No: 13 of the 5th January (File 2884 E.A.)

(2) The question of making the Assistants in this Department permanent and pensionable has been raised by Mr. Woosnam. He has been told that he may raise the point with the Governor on his return to East Africa, but the Secretary of State has given no undertaking to agree

to a recommendation that the Assistants should be permanent and pensionable, if the Governor does put it forward.

(3) I agree that some one ought to be at Headquarters when the Game Warden is away on tour; and as there is a suitable local candidate for the post of Assistant, we might accept the Governor's recommendation of Mr. Seth Smith for the appointment.

Total £4.382.

Head 25. Immigration Department.

No observations.

Total £394.

Head 26. Survey Department.

(1) As regards the proposed increase in staff, viz: 1 District Surveyor, 2 Senior Staff Surveyors, 4 Assistant Junior Staff Surveyors, 2 Computers, 2 Draughtsmen and 1 Record Clerk - you are in a better position as Secretary of the Survey Committee than anyone else in the Department to say how far so large an addition is requisite.

(2) The salaries which have been in many cases revised are ~~corrected~~ shown at the ~~dates mentioned~~ but since the Estimates were drafted it has been decided to make the post of Chief Computer permanent and pensionable with a salary of £360 by £20 to £400 (Gov./1961/-13-14)

(3) The salary for the new Deputy Director of Surveys (Trigonometrical and Topographical Branch) who is pensionable is under consideration. When Captain Coode goes,

800. Captain Kemphorne is to be Deputy Director, but the salary £667 may then be reduced. When this promotion takes effect the obelisk will disappear from the "2 Assistants" and the Deputy Director's appointment will be starred as pensionable for Captain Kemphorne personally.

Total £35.50.

Head 27. Land Office.

(1) The Department is re-arranged as already approved on Gov./19234/13; but provision is made for a Conveyancing Assistant and 4 European Clerks; as to the latter, we have had 3 extra in 1913-14, their salaries being met from savings. As to the Conveyancing Assistant, I notice a tendency to try to get away from £250 as the initial salary for these junior superior appointments. If £250 is good enough for a man who just come down from the "Varsity, surely £250 is good enough for a "reliable Solicitor's Clerk". Should not the initial salary of this post be reduced to £250? If every other post in this Department is permanent and pensionable, I should have thought that this should be also; and the prospect of pension should assist in getting a good man. I take it that there is no likelihood of the Land Office going short of work in the East African Protectorate.

Total £8.445.

Head 28. Public Works Department.

(1) The new salaries and establishment in the Public Works Department have already been approved and the ^{previous} new posts filled up (Gov./36165/13 and papers). But the

Governor

8

Governor now wants an Electrical Engineer at £400 by £20 to £500 (no duty allowance) and he is asking for incremental scales for the 6 Overseers (£200 by £10 to £250 instead of £200 fixed) and the 11 Foremen (£180 by £10 to £200 instead of £180 fixed). I agree that an Electrical Engineer should be appointed - an agreement in the first instance at any rate - and if we cannot keep our subordinate Public Works staff without increments, I suppose that we must agree to the Governor's proposals. But compare the Police: why should a Public Works Overseer get £200 to £250, if an Inspector gets only £200 fixed? I suppose the Governor's reply would be that we ought to introduce incremental salaries into the Non-Commissioned Officers ranks of the Police also - £150 to £200 for the Assistant Inspectors and £200 to £250 for the Inspectors. Incidentally, the Overseers and Foremen are not, as a class, pensionable, where Police are.

(2) If the Foremen get £180 by £10 to £200, we must put up the Steam Roller Drivers also. This was the scale originally suggested by the Governor on Gov./36273/13, but we then told the Crown Agents to engage the driver on £180 fixed.

Total £152,056.

Head 23. Public Works Recurrent.

(1) There is an increase of £8,970 on this head, mainly due to maintenance and Repair of Roads and Bridges, on which doubtless expenditure is badly needed.

(2) I am not quite clear why we should have a large vote under this Head for "Rents of Offices and Houses

and

and allowances in lieu of quarters" as distinct from the numerous "house allowances" provided for under the various heads of the Estimates. The Protectorate Government I know, distinguishes between a "house allowance" given to a man who owns and occupies his own house, and an "allowance in lieu of quarters" to a man who is entitled to free quarters but for whom no Government quarters are available and who does not own his own house; but why separate the votes?

Total £38,600.

Head 30. Public Works Extraordinary.

(1) It is not really possible for me to criticise the Public Works Extraordinary. There is so much that wants doing, that we may be sure that the Governor will select the most urgent requirements; and even if there were more funds available, there is always the difficulty of getting sufficient labour. I am particularly glad to see the beginning of the Government Offices provided for at last and a European Hospital at Kisumu; the water supply in various stations is being carefully looked to. But one has an idea that more might be expended with advantage on out-station accommodation for European officials. Perhaps East Africa is better off than Uganda in this respect, but I would like to enquire what accommodation is available in these out-stations. If, for instance, at Afmedu Mr. Filletl has to live in a miserable hut, it would be far preferable to build him a decent house than to add to the Chief Secretary's house in Nairobi.

(2) As to new Roads and Bridges, we know that much is needed - and the provisions in these Estimates may well

well be inadequate. But the Loan Bill should afford relief here.

Total £105,252.

Head 31. Abolition of Slavery.

The original vote for this service was £40,000. The Courts are gradually working off the claims for compensation under the Abolition of the Legal Status of Slavery and the Amending Ordinances, if made prior to 1st January 1912. About 25% of the claims are disallowed and the compensation is £5 a slave generally. It was anticipated early in 1912 that the £40,000 grant would be ultimately exceeded by £1,466, but fortunately the excess can now be reduced to £370.

Total £370.

Head 32. Coast Land Settlement.

The salaries of the Surveying Staff are improved to correspond with those provided for in the Survey Department.

Head 33.

Head 35. Loan Charses.

(1) Sinking fund at 1% is not payable on the £175,000 loan until 1st April 1920.

(2) I do not follow why if the Thika Railway ^{previous} cost £62,770 (see Treas./39903/13 and papers) out of the £250,000 loan, that is to say the original £60,000 plus £2,770 taken out of the money allocated for the Kilindini Harbour scheme, only interest and sinking fund on £47,000 should be provided. The explanation is that probably the first portion of the necessary expenditure was met from Protectorate balances and that loan funds consequently

not been drawn upon; but we may as well ask for a full statement. See us to Thika Railway Appendix J.A.

Total £15,240.

Head 34. Magadi Expenditure.

The question of making special provision for Magadi expenditure was referred to in the minutes on Gov./481/13, 14. The Governor has allowed only £7,000, when the General Manager asked for £29,500. No further details are given as to this - possibly because it is Railway expenditure; but we should at any rate ask for information as to what is required and how far the expenditure of £29,500 is urgently needed, as we could without danger, I think, find this sum (or at least a considerable part of it) from balances.

Total £7,000.

Head 35. Currency Department.

It is right that this expenditure should be shown under a separate head. The question of the Currency Order in Council is now under consideration and I believe that the Governor's pronouncements to remuneration of the Commissioners ~~have been~~ reported in the Colonial Office. Provisionally, therefore, I leave the details unaltered. See also Revenue Head 4, where £655 appears as a reimbursement in aid.

Total £655.

Of the Appendices A. B. C. and D. deal with the general financial position (see Minute); E. and F. have been examined in detail above under Railway Expenditure.

Expenditure.

G has been examined under Pensions; H. does not call for comment; I differs from Appendix D. in the Uganda Estimates - this is due to provision for an Assistant Postmaster General; but see above as to this under Post and Telegraph Expenditure; J. and K. are of interest, but call for no comment at this stage, except as regards J.D: the Governor has just recommended very strongly (Gov./3930/14) that special duty allowances should be given to the Engineers engaged on the Mombasa Water Supply, £200 to the Resident Engineer and £50 each to the 2 Assistants. But the Resident Engineer, Mr. Blain, is drawing £440 as a Public Work Executive Engineer plus £100 from loan funds: surely another £100 should suffice and indeed this is what Governor may really mean; I would accept his recommendation subject to this modification, if it is a modification. I presume that the money for the allowances come from loan funds.

In continuation of my despatch No. 960 of the 9th ultimo, I have the honour to transmit six copies of the draft Estimates for 1914-15, together with twelve copies of the Treasurer's Budget Statement and two copies of Schedules of Differences between the draft Estimates for 1914-15 and the sanctioned ~~Estimates~~ for the current financial year.

2. The Appropriation Bill was read a first time at the recent session of the Legislative Council and was left in Committee, on the second reading which was adjourned until the next session. No amendments were made or proposed but certain minor alterations will be necessary before the Bill becomes law.

3. A net deduction of £3,507 will be required from both Revenue and Expenditure owing to the fact that certain alterations were made in the Busoga Railway and Marine estimates at the instance of the Uganda Government after they had been originally submitted. The figures in respect of these services are, as you are aware, included in the East Africa Protectorate Estimates although this

Protectorate is not in any way concerned with the financial aspect of the undertakings, the net profit being transferred to Uganda.

4. The Treasurer has gone into considerable detail in his Budget Statement and Schedules of Differences, but it is necessary for me to supplement the explanations given by him by the following remarks.

5. Due regard has been paid to caution in the preparation of the Revenue estimates and it is quite possible that the Customs and Hut Tax figures will be considerably exceeded. As regards the latter item especially, I have hopes that the closer administration, which will be possible with the greatly increased Administrative Staff, will result in a considerable increase of Revenue but as the full effect of this will not be felt during the forthcoming year, I have not deemed it expedient to venture on a higher figure than that inserted, viz: £170,100.

6. I have included in the various Expenditure Schedules provision for increases in the salaries attached to certain posts. Some of them have already formed the subject of correspondence with you, but others are now put forward for the first time. I will deal with these latter cases in my remarks on the different schedules, but I desire to take this opportunity of stating that, although I am not at present making any detailed representations on the subject, I am of opinion that the salaries attached to some of the higher posts are no longer commensurate with the duties and responsibilities which now fall to the lot of the

X holders, and which have increased very considerably since the salaries were fixed. I propose to address you on this matter at a later date with a view to an improvement in the conditions in 1916-17.

7. The rise in wages caused by the steadily increasing demand for labour has made it necessary generally to increase those items which involve the employment of natives. This is of course an inevitable result of the extension of European enterprise and the more intense development of the resources of the Protectorate.

8. Schedule 6 - Provincial Administration, Province of Seyidie. This portion of the Schedule has been re-arranged in a more convenient manner. The "Mombasa Conservancy", which will form the nucleus of the contemplated Municipality, has been shown separately. I am asking that the salary of the Superintendent may be increased. The present sanctioned scale is £300 by £20 to £400 and I suggest that it should now be fixed at £400 by £20 to £500. The holder of the post Mr. S. Sanderson - has been on the maximum pay of the existing scale for three years and I suggest that he enter the new scale at £400. It has been necessary to increase the salary of the Conservancy Conservancy both as regards personal emoluments and other charges. The recent epidemics of small-pox and plague have accentuated the necessity for ensuring a more sanitary condition of affairs on the Island and, although I have not been able to insert the full amount asked for by the Provincial Commissioner, I trust that a greatly improved state of affairs will result from the provision made.

9. I have in contemplation the removal of the Mombasa Trolley lines, which are showing signs of being no longer able to cope with the increased trade of the Port and which seriously interfere with other systems of transport. Until, however, I am able to arrive at a definite decision on the subject it is necessary that the provision shall stand though it may be desirable some time during the year to apply for sanction to re-allocate the unspent portion and to make use of it for some alternative transport facilities.

10. Schedule 7 - Treasury. I am asking that a personal allowance of £20 may be approved for the Head Cashier - Mr. Aderji - in recognition of his long and faithful service.

11. Schedule 8 - Customs. I recommend that the European Baggage Examiners be in future styled "Preventive Officers" and that their salaries be increased to the new scale proposed for European Clerks.

12. Schedule 9a - Port and Marine, Special Expenditure. £500 is required for a new surveying buoy in Mombasa Harbour and £1,600 for a motor launch for the Tana River District. This latter is very necessary in order that the Officer in charge of the Tana River District may be able to proceed up the river expeditiously. Trouble is constantly arising in consequence of the movements of Somalis in the upper reaches of the river which are at present at times quite out of touch with the Coast. Increased provision is also necessary for improving the water-way of the Tana and a motor launch for Mombasa and a boat for Kisimayu are also required.

13. Schedule 11 - Legal Departments. Administrator General. I am inserting provision for a duty allowance of £25 for the officer acting as Nairobi Agent for the Administrator General.

Registration of Documents Department. The question of the salaries of the "Registrars" is under correspondence with you and any necessary alterations will be made in due course.

14. Schedule 13 - Prisons. After carefully considering the matter and after having appointed a Special Committee of senior officers to report to me on the subject I have decided to make some alterations in the organisation of our Prisons. The abolition of the Prisons Board and the substitution of a Commissioner as the central authority, a change which has already been approved by you in connection with the new Prisons Ordinance, has necessitated some alterations in the designation of the posts filled by Major Edwards and Mr. Gray. I have inserted the post of "Commissioner" in the Estimates on a scale of £500 by £25 to £600 and a duty allowance of £50 but no special provision has been made for 1914-15 for the reason that I propose that for so long as the post is filled by the Inspector General of Prisons, the latter shall continue to draw the special duty allowance of £40 provided for his Prisons duties. The salary of the Assistant Commissioner is inserted at the same rate as that hitherto drawn by the "Inspector". I propose that Mr. Gray shall fill the new post with which will be combined that of Superintendent of the Nairobi Prison. As regards the Mombasa Prison I propose to substitute

substitute a Superintendent for a First Grade Gaoler at a salary of £250 by £15 to £400 and I strongly recommend that Mr. Hill, on whose work I have received excellent reports, be promoted to the new post.

I find that in practice the old system whereby the Provincial Commissioners and District Commissioners were respectively "Superintendents" and "Assistant Superintendents" of the two big prisons at Nairobi and Mombasa did not work satisfactorily. Their other work did not permit of sufficient attention being paid to their prisons duties, a state of affairs which led to some very unsatisfactory results in the Nairobi Prison where the Gaoler proved unfitted to discharge the duties which devolved on him through lack of supervision although there is no reason to suppose that he is unfitted for the post of Gaoler under the direct control of a Superintendent who can devote more time to his work than was possible under the former system. With the abolition of the Prisons Board I consider that Mr. Gray, who acted as its Secretary, will have adequate time to supervise the Nairobi Prison and he is well qualified for the post of Superintendent.

15. As explained in the Treasurer's Budget Statement the Prisons Special Expenditure has now been included in the ordinary Prisons Vote. Although it may still be necessary to establish special prisons camps outside the central prisons, it appears to me that the normal cost of the custody of the prisoners should figure as recurrent expend-

iture.

expenditure. Any special expenditure entailed by the establishment of prisons camps will be a charge against the works on which the convicts are employed.

16. Schedule 14 - Medical Departments. The extra Staff as detailed in the Treasurer's Budget Statement is very necessary. As it is, I have been obliged to curtail very considerably the demands of the Principal Medical Officer. I should have been willing to have provided the whole amount asked for by him but for lack of funds. At the same time it may prove more satisfactory in the end to build up the Department to its ultimate strength gradually rather than to make a sudden and large increase in establishment.

I am asking that the salary of the Bacteriologist may be increased and put on a scale of £600 by £25, to £700 instead of fixed at £600, and that his title be altered to "Director of Laboratories". Having regard to the very great importance of the duties of the post, I consider that it is at present inadequately remunerated apart from the fact that the present holder Dr. Ross has filled it for over ten years in the most satisfactory manner.

17. Schedule 16 - Education. Here again financial exigencies have compelled me to reduce considerably the estimates as originally submitted by the Director of Education. I have, however, provided for a new native school in the Nyanza Province and for a grant to the school which is to be established by the Magadi Soda Company at its "settlement".

18. Schedule 17 - Transport. I am asking that a personal allowance of £12 may be granted to the Head Clerk, Mr. Barros, who has 17 years excellent

service.

service. I am transferring the old Government House motor car to the Transport Department for use in and around Nairobi, and am providing £100 for the salary of my Asiatic Chauffeur, who will also act as a Clerk in the Nairobi Office. I am also providing £200 for a motor boat for the Director of Transport and Principal Immigration Officer who with its assistance will be able to expedite his work very considerably.

19. Schedule 18 - Military. I have made provision for the new post of Quartermaster at the request of the Officer Commanding Troops. The Inspector General, King's African Rifles, supports this request after having visited Serenli and the Marehan country and having had an opportunity of studying the existing arrangements for the supply and transport of rations. I will address you later as to the qualifications required for the officer to be appointed to this post.

20. Schedule 19 - Miscellaneous. I have made provision for £25 for the purchase of copies of a Kikuyu Grammar which is about to be produced by one of the Missionaries working there. It is expected that these will be of great service to the officers serving in the Kikuyu country and it appears to me that publications of this sort should be encouraged by Government. I have also inserted £150 as a contribution to a Municipal Fire Brigade to be established in Nairobi as the large number of Government buildings, many of which are of highly inflammable material, in my opinion justify some financial assistance being rendered by Government for such a service.

21. Schedule 20. Post Office and Telegraphs. I have found it necessary again to increase the staff of this Department. The excess over the estimates for the current year is £11,320 but as you are aware an increase in establishment over the original provision for 1913-14 has already been approved. The increase in Post Office and Telegraph Revenue is £16,700. The expenditure on Telegraph construction has been limited by the funds at my disposal and I have selected the items for which provision is made from a list of works all of which were desirable in the interests of business or administration.

22. Schedule 21 - Railway Department. I have personally scrutinized these estimates with the General Manager item by item and am unable to recommend any reduction of the provision made.

23. Schedule 21a - Railway Special Expenditure. I have found it necessary to reduce very considerably the expenditure asked for by the General Manager, but I hope that funds will be made available from other sources.

24. Schedule 22 - Agricultural Department. Asking that an allowance of £25 may be approved for the officer who acts as Editor of the Agricultural Journal, that a duty allowance of £40 be attached to the posts of Chiefs of the Economic Plants and Entomological Divisions and that the maximum of the salary of the Manager of the Naivasha Stock Farm be raised to £450. The former holder of this post, which is unpensionable, was drawing £300 per annum.

I have provided for the establishment of an experimental farm on the Usain Gishu Plateau, at a total cost of £2,350. I consider that assistance of this description should be given to this closely settled

settled area, on my inspection of which I have already reported to you.

In the Veterinary Division I have provided for four additional Veterinary Officers to cope with the increasing stock industry in the Protectorate. The Chief Veterinary Officer has asked for seven additional appointments but I have not seen my way to support his recommendations in full because of lack of funds.

25. Schedule 23 - Forest Department. I am asking for one additional Assistant Conservator of Forests at £250 per annum and am recommending that Mr. Jackson be promoted to the post of Deputy Conservator. I am aware that the case of this officer has been considered by you recently and that you were unable to see your way to approve my previous recommendation on the subject of his position in the Department. In your Confidential despatch of May 16th you informed me that provision might be made in next year's Estimates for Mr. Jackson's salary on a scale of £300 by £15 to £400. I am, however, convinced that the work of the Forest Department is of such importance as to justify the appointment of a Deputy Conservator, for which post Mr. Jackson is eminently suited. I trust that you will be able to reconsider your previous decision and agree to the rate of salary now proposed by me.

26. Schedule 24 - Game Department. I have provided for one additional Assistant in the Game Department as our financial position now justifies an increase in the Staff. In the event of the new appointment being approved I suggest that it be offered to a

local candidate Mr. M. Seth-Smith, who is strongly recommended by the ~~Local Magistrate~~ and whose local knowledge and special qualifications render him, in my opinion, specially suitable for the post.

27. Schedule 26 - Survey Department. I have considered it necessary to augment the Staff of the Cadastral Branch to the extent detailed in the Treasurer's Budget Statement. Delay in the survey of farms has caused considerable inconvenience in the past and our financial position now enables me to make more adequate provision than has been possible hitherto. The increase in the Staff naturally entails a corresponding increase under "Other Charges".

28. Schedule 27 - Land Department. I am asking that a new appointment of Conveyancing Assistant may be approved at the increase in the work of the Department in my opinion justifies the creation of such a post. A reliable solicitor's clerk is required to fill it. Provision is also made for four additional European clerks of which three are already with your approval being paid from savings.

29. Schedule 28 - Public Works Department. In addition to the extra staff recently approved by you, I am making provision for the new post of Electrical Engineer. I consider such an appointment very desirable. His duties would consist of the periodical testing of installations in Government buildings, inspection of all supply lines run by Electric Lighting and Power Companies in public thoroughfares for the protection of the public and of telephone installations, inspection of plans for all new electrical projects and general adviser to

(12)

Government on any question in connection with the supply of electric current which may arise. I also propose that small annual increments of £10 be attached to the posts of Overseers and Foremen bringing the maximum pay of these officers up to £250 and £200 respectively. The large local demand for these classes of workers renders it desirable to hold out some prospects of advancement in the Department. Certain additions to the more junior staff are also necessary.

30. Schedule 29 - Public Works Recurrent. Our improved financial position has enabled me to make more adequate provision under this Head, although still larger sums could be expended advantageously were funds available.

31. Schedule 30 - Public Works Extraordinary. I have been able to provide a total of £105,989 under this Head as against this year's figure of £65,551, an increase of £40,438 or over 60%. I have selected the works detailed with much care from a total estimate, submitted by the Director of Public Works on the recommendation of Heads of Departments and Provincial Commissioners, of £365,954, which did not include the special Road Vote of £10,900. It is impossible to give a full list of all the proposed more or less urgent works have necessarily been omitted. Item 2, New Government Offices, Nairobi, is to commence the new Secretariat Block including a Council Chamber. The total cost of this block is estimated at £15,000 and it is proposed to complete it in the 1915-16. I hope in the estimates for that year to be able to commence a larger building programme for headquarter

(13)

headquarter offices and new Law Courts, the urgent necessity for which is known to you. Lack of funds in the past has been the cause of the accumulation of very considerable arrears in building requirements and there is hardly a station in the Protectorate which is complete. It will take many years to wipe off these arrears and to keep abreast of the constantly increasing requirements unless some special funds are made available for these services. I have been able to increase the provision for housing accommodation at Mombasa and Nairobi very considerably, but the provision made is by no means adequate and we are still committed to the expensive system of renting houses or of granting house allowances. The provision under New Roads and Bridges is in my opinion totally inadequate and I trust that funds will be made available from other sources. It is quite impossible to attempt to meet requirements in communications out of Revenue.

32. Schedule 34 - Special Expenditure for 1914
 I have previously alluded to the necessity for reducing the estimate originally submitted by the General Manager and here again I trust that special funds will be available to meet these requirements.

33. I will address you in due course on the subject of filling various new appointments which appear in the draft Estimates.

34. The estimated financial position of the Protectorate on 31st March 1914 is shown in Appendix B to the Estimates and discloses an estimated surplus of £192,625. As it is not at present proposed to intrench on this surplus in connection with the

Estimates for 1919-20, I trust that the position will be considered satisfactory and that your approval will be forthcoming to the various proposals now put forward by me for next year's Budget.
