get what any "Chief Clerks";

on estimate; but the maximum
will be £160 - a sum which
the growing P.S. (as in Eng.) should
be able easily to meet.

This question whether for
the sake of uniformity Uganda
could not also have the scale
£150 by £10 to £150, and
give a assistance all clerks in
Uganda of £25 decreasing
annually by £10 - in this
way newly appointed Uganda
clerk would remain at
£175 for 3 years and get

ahead of Sal. clerks in
their emoluments.

1. In considering the proposed improvement in the
 conditions of service for Particular Corps
