Sir,

In continuation of my Confidential despatch of January 6th, 1914, regarding the survey and construction of a branch line of railway from Nakuru to the Uasin Gishu Plateau and the North Kavirondo country, I have the honour to transmit for your information copy of a further communication from the General Manager covering copy of a Memorandum by Mr Church, Chief Engineer, on the subject of the survey, together with an estimate of the cost.

2. The sum of £400, which is probably all that can be spent on preliminary survey during the remainder of the current financial year, can be met from savings, but you will observe that the further expenditure necessary is calculated at £10,000 in the forthcoming year and £6,000 in 1915-16. As a sum of £3,000 only has been provided in respect of this work in the draft Estimates for 1914-15, it will be necessary to find special provision to meet the additional cost.

In continuation of my letter No. 16/14 of
the 30th December last, I have the honor to forward a
memorandum on an estimate for the survey of a railway
from Nakuru to the North Kavirendo District.

3. The estimate has been prepared by Mr. [unclear]
who has had much experience on survey work in this
country. The total cost £16,000 is higher than was ant-
icipated but any additional sum spent in investigation
of the country and its resources before construction
will be recovered many times over in savings on capital
expenditure. I beg therefore that action may be ad-
mitted to this estimate.

4. If the staff were ordered at once I do not
think we could put them in the field before the end of
June and this means we could reckon on only nine months
work during 1914-15 and I therefore ask for an allot-
ment of £10,000 for expenditure during the coming year.

4. The Secretary of State will approve of the survey being continued, forthwith if the expenditure can be met from savings of the financial year.

I have been fortunate to find Mr. Bailey who only lately left is willing to join us again for two months and I have arranged with him to do a flying survey and to investigate the alternative routes at the same time.

These alternative routes are detailed in Mr. Churchill's Memorandum and it is very necessary they be thoroughly investigated as one of the alternatives is much favoured by the Farmers of the Solai and Kali Valleys.

5. We shall spend during 1918-19 probably between £500 and £400 and this also can be put from "Works Extraordinary". I propose Mr. Bailey be given a salary at the rate of £1,000/- a year as before. He is well worth this. Mr. Bailey sailed for home on April 4th so we do not anticipate returning to India for over 8 months.

6. The proposal to employ Mr. Bailey has been approved of by His Excellency and I ask that formal sanction may be accorded to the temporary engagement for two to three months at a salary at the rate of £1,000/- a year and that sanction be also accorded to an expenditure of £400 on the survey during 1918-19 against "Works Extraordinary".

MEMORANDUM AND ESTIMATE ON THE SURVEY
OF THE MAKURU MUMIAS LINE

1. The distance according to MacDonald's survey from Makuru to Mumias is approximately 185 miles.

The only length that there may be any considerable variation from MacDonald's route is between Makuru and Melia.

Two alternatives will have to be examined.

a. Makuru to the North of Menengai about 25 miles.

b. Njoro to the Melia direct about 15 miles.

The total length of survey to be undertaken will then come 220.

2. It took me with an Assistant Engineer and for part of the time two Assistant Engineers fifteen months to survey and take out the line between Mai Summit and Kisumu a distance of roughly 90 miles.

A second party of the same strength took a year to survey and stake out between Makuru and Mai Summit about 45 miles in length but they had many 20 miles of forest against only ten miles. I do not think therefore that the whole survey between Makuru and Mumias can be completed with the setting out much less than eighteen months employing two parties consisting of a District Engineer and Assistant Engineer and necessary staff of surveyors etc.

In my letter No. 6940/3 of the 5th December 1913, I said I thought that it could be done within a year but I had at that time realised the length of the survey. I am therefore going to base my estimate of the survey taking 1½ years to complete.

3. The Eldama Ravine seems to be a point where it would be advisable to go far to the South of the Government Station possible so as to avoid a heavy gradient.

Between the Ravine and Melo River the line will in all probability run over the saddle between Londiani and Eldeket at an approximate level of 6400 feet.

I would suggest that this would be the starting point of the two parties' No. 1 party would then survey the three routes to Nakuru and No. 2 party would climb up to South of the Ravine and would probably be well on the plateau by the time No. 1 party had completed the survey to Nakuru etc.

No. 1 party would then proceed to Mumias and survey along MacDonald's route to meet No. 2 party and they should meet somewhere near Eldeket.

4. The maximum grade should be 2.60 and the sharpest curvature 800 feet radius.

If possible I would advocate a $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ on downward journey, Mumias to Nakuru, it might be practicable.

Where heavy work is likely to occur deviations might be made for temporary lines with sharper curvature and heavier loads and even reversing stations (which I prefer to increased loads and curvature) but the main line must not be sacrificed, work them in.

5. I would suggest that sites for stations be established every ten miles taking into account water supplies etc. These station sites should be on the level for at least 1200 feet and the straight or very easy curvature. Probably stations twenty miles apart will be sufficient for some years but as traffic increases especially on the $\frac{2}{3}$ sections extra stations will be required and it is as well to bear this in mind and make provision for them, as it is difficult to do so afterwards without altering the alignment.

6. There should be no difficulty as regards food as the Uasin Gishu district, the Uasin Gishu plateau and Melo flats have any quantity of maize. A feed store at the Ravine and at Nakuru would be all that is necessary to start with and contracts could be let for the supply of feed at these points.

The maize will have to be ground either by contract or by ourselves. Later on a depot could be formed at Eldoret, and another at Mumias. Each party would have to have a sufficient number of men to fetch the feed from these depots to the camp.
