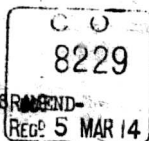

MEMORANDUM

THE REGISTRATION REGULATIONS
AMENDMENT ORDINANCE, 1913.



The East Africa Registration Regulations 1901 require that all documents conferring or purporting to confer, declare, limit or extinguish any right, title, or interest whether vested or contingent to, in or over immoveable property shall be registered.

Registration under the Regulations is effected by copying the document in a Register kept for the purpose.

As no exception is made to the general requisition it necessarily follows that every share in a joint stock company owning immoveable property in the Protectorate and every debenture of such company charging such immoveable property must be separately copied into the Register at the expense of the holder of the share or debenture.

As no useful purpose is served by the registration of such documents it is proposed to exempt the same, subject to certain conditions, from the general requisition of the Regulations.

The documents mentioned in Section 2 of this Ordinance have already been exempted from registration under Part II of the Land Titles Amendment Ordinance 1910.

2. The Ordinance is in my opinion a necessary and proper measure for enactment in this Protectorate.
