Asiatic Surgeons & Compounders

Refers to Regn 12 of Rules for employment, & recommends that all present as well as future holders of posts of Asst Surgeon & Sub Asst Surgeon be given permanent & pensionable status.

In Reply to Mr. ...

(1) For Pension Rules for Indian Medical Subordinates recorded from Govt of India, see sec^s 119, 15, of the Rules (in the ...) in Govt/1888/12 P.P.P. At present the Prot^s undertake to pay to the Govt of India a pension contribution for these men at Indian rates, for the period of recordment. (see 11.)

(2) We have approved (see sec^s 12 of the Rules for Indian Med. Sub^ds recruited from other sources) of pensions, under the Reg^s relating to Pensions and Gratuities for the Subordinate Staff, dated F.O. Mar, 15, 1903, for men not recorded from the Indian Govt. (see memo in O.G. 18862/13 Uga.)

[In both cases only Asst Surgeons and Sub Asst Surgeons are pensionable: Compounders are eligible for Gratuity only.]

With regard to case C in para 2 of their despatch from the Indian Govt, ... who at the end of their period of recordment, elect to remain in the Prot. service, should, I consider, be allowed

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to cut themselves off from the service
of the Indian Govt. and to be placed on the
permanent subordinate staff of the Post, the
period of seconded service to count for
purposes from the Post. (as in the case of
India) ~~and~~ from the G.P.O.

? Tell the Govt. and ask him to arrange
accordingly with the Indian Govt. and to
insert a clause ^{in the Rules for Ind. M.S.} in
seconded from India.

Case (2) is really covered by the Rule for
Ind. M. S. recruited from other sources
than India (sec 12). If such a Subt^e enters
a post vacated by a man seconded from
India, he enters it under the conditions
of service which we have approved, and is
therefore entitled to pension.

Perhaps both cases would be covered if
we approve of all parts of Sec Act.
Surgeon and Sub Act. Surgeon being
made permanent and pensionable, and
suggest to the Govt. as in minute above, that
the ~~Sec~~ Rule for Ind. Subt^e recruited from
India should be amended to allow a
seconded man to elect either to re-ent^r to
India, or to cut himself off from India
and join the permanent and pensionable
staff of the G. Post.

As regards the former class, I think

Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your despatch
No. 708 of the 28th of August 1913 on the subject
of the Rules for the Employment of Asiatic Surgeons
and Compounders.

2. A clause is contained in these rules, with regard to Pensions and Gratuities, but this in itself is insufficient to warrant appointments of this nature being treated as permanent and pensionable without your definite sanction. Several of the posts of Assistant Surgeon and Sub-Assistant Surgeon are held by Medical Assistants seconded from the service of the Government of India while the remainder are filled by Medical Assistants recruited either locally or by the Agents in India from sources outside that service. Those who are seconded from the service of the Government of India would naturally not be considered pensionable but it is quite conceivable that in the future some of these posts will be held by men:-

(1) Who, though originally serving under the Government of India, have resigned from that service and elected to continue in the employment of

of this Protectorate, or

(2) Who, recruited from outside sources, have succeeded the posts originally filled by men in the employ of the Government of India and subsequently vacated by reason of the original holders having, on the expiry of their tour of service in this Protectorate, reverted to their Indian appointments.

3. Cases have occurred where Sub-Assistant Surgeons, who originally belonged to the service of the Government of India, have been seconded to this Protectorate and, in order to remain here, have subsequently resigned their former service. They have returned to this Protectorate at their own expense and, being evidently under the impression that their service was pensionable, have re-entered the Medical Department on agreements locally signed.

4. In view, therefore, of regulation No. 12 of the Rules under reference, I would ask that all present as well as future holders of the posts of Assistant Surgeon and Sub-Assistant Surgeon be given permanent and pensionable status and I trust that this recommendation will meet with your approval.
