I have the honour to acknowledge, with thanks, the receipt of your Private and Personal cypher telegram of the 17th instant, the contents of which have afforded me much patisfaction.

- 2. I am unable at the present time to hazard an opinion whether the concessions mentioned in your telegram will be accepted as a fair and final settlement of all outstanding points, but I am confident that they will go a long way towards effecting an adjustment of differences.
- 3. With reference to the concluding words of the first paragraph of your telegram, I would point out that the views expressed in my private letter are those held by myself, while para. 7 of my Confidential despatch of January 8th described what I understand to be the views of the settlers. Any difference therefore which may be noted in the terms of the two communications is not necessarily in the nature of an incommission.

I am informed that the Convention of Associations has appointed a Committee to consider the Bill, and their observations when received will be had before the received with the received with
