Brassey Edwards' report for Jan 1914 is merely "he has earned the approval of the C.V.O." He was placed on the permanent staff last year.

Osborne (File 627) has the same report as Brassey-Edwards for 1914, and a rather fuller report for Dec. 1913 in which he is stated to be "a capable officer" who has returned the settlers in the neighbourhood of Nakuru-land, and is competent ~~to~~ to fill the responsible position which he holds."

Thomson (File 2320) has the same report as the above for 1914 and in 1912 is stated to have earned a good report from the C.V.O.

McCall (1988) has the same report as above for 1914 - is taking annual leave during his present leave and is to represent the P.A.D. at the International Red Cross Congress, which is to take place in August, 1914.

It was placed on the permanent staff at the same time as McKenna, viz July 1913.

So judge from the accounts given of the work of these two officers on 22728 there is not much to choose between them. Mr. McCall has done good work amongst settlers on the main Gertini plateau (mainly Boxos I suppose) and Mr. Kennedy distinguished himself during the Masai Move.

Mr. McCall will no doubt feel a little sore at Mr. Kennedy's promotion, but after all he was one step a little more than a month earlier.

I think we cannot do better than follow the Gov's recommendations in the matter though the promotion of Mr. Kennedy above Mr. Kennedy is certainly a strong measure. H.P.D. 295/14

Sir,

I have the honour to address you on the subject of the appointment of a Deputy Chief Veterinary Officer in succession to Mr Brandt.

2. The post is one which demands certain essential qualifications in view of the importance of the stock industry to the future of the Protectorate and must be filled by an Officer who is energetic and tactful, thoroughly versed in the theory and practice of his profession and possessed of conspicuous administrative ability. His duties will bring him into contact with all sections of the community and much will depend on his character and personality.

3. I have been into the matter very thoroughly with the Heads of Departments concerned and regret very much that I have to report that none of the senior members of the Veterinary Staff would appear to possess the necessary attributes, although well qualified for work in the field and for the duties of the posts which they hold at present.
