Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Secret despatch of date March 31st 1914 under cover of which you have transmitted for my observations a letter with enclosures from the Foreign Office on the subject of a possible modification of the northern frontier of the East Africa Protectorate.

2. Being personally unacquainted with the locality in question, and having derived such elementary knowledge as I possess on the subject solely from reports submitted by officers familiar with the country, I feel that I cannot offer personal observations which would be of any real value. I would suggest however that advantage be taken of the presence in England of Messrs Thesiger and Hope to ascertain their views as to the extent, if any, to which the boundary might be re-defined with advantage under the circumstances foreshadowed in your communication.

3. In this connection it seems desirable to point out that the territory which is at present comprised in the Northern Frontier and Jubaland divisions of this

this Protectorate has never yet been effectively administered, and to state that recent inquiries have convinced me that the necessary efficiency cannot be attained without substantial additional outlay regarding which I shall shortly address you in another despatch. If therefore any arrangement is eventually concluded which will have the effect of attaching an additional area to the Northern District, still further expenditure will be entailed which must for some years to come be classed as unremunerative and which cannot be conveniently met from local resources.

With reference to the letter from this department of the 1st of March, I am directed by Mr. Secretary Harcourt to transmit to you, to be laid before Secretary Sir E. Grey, a copy of a despatch from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate on the subject of the possible modification of the northern frontier of the Protectorate.

2. If Sir E. Grey concurs, Mr. Harcourt would suggest that the question of the northern frontier should be discussed at the Foreign Office by representatives of the Foreign Office and Colonial Office, Mr. Melville and Mr. Hope, to whom the Governor refers. It has to add that Mr. Hope is now on leave, but that he is too ill to attend to any business at present.
