I have the honour to refer to your despatch No. 310 of April 1st respecting the issue of arms and military kit to Non-commissioned Officers and Sappers employed on Survey duty.

2. The Director of Surveys considers such issues necessary on the ground that the men may be required to attend ceremonial functions in uniform, that they may be attached to military patrols and expeditions, and that they may have to go through a course of drills as a preliminary to a promotion examination. He gives as instances the occasion of His late Majesty's Birthday in 1906 and 1907 when such attendance was ordered, and the Marakwet expedition

expedition to which Captain Coode was attached because no Royal Engineer Non-Commissioned Officer was available. He also cites several cases in which Corporals were required to attend a course of drills in uniform.

3. Captain King further states that a rifle and ammunition are needed for protection against wild animals.

4. The reasons given do not appear to me to justify the issues in question and I would advise that the practice of making them be discontinued.
