Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge
the receipt of your Confidential despatch of
the 25th of May on the subject of Lord Cran-
worth's proposals for the extension of the
Nairobi-Thika Railway to Mount Kenya.

2. Although it will no doubt be
advisable to embark on this enterprise at
some future date, I am of opinion that it is
not a matter of urgency at the present time.
The points raised in paragraph 3 of your
despatch under reply constitute serious
objections to the immediate inception of such
a project, and I consider it would be a mis-
take to encourage a proposal which would

have the effect of imposing a heavy additional tax on the local labour supply and on the capacity of our wharf and railway, both of which will have to be strained to the utmost in order to meet the requirements of our present programme.

3. The General Manager has already made arrangements for the establishment of agencies at Fort Hall and Nyeri to be worked in connection with the Uganda Railway. At these stations warehousemen and goods clerks are to be posted who will take delivery of goods, and the transport to the Thika will be effected by means of bullock wagons under the supervision of a firm of contractors. This experiment is to be inaugurated at an early date and we shall then be in a position to gauge the possibilities of the traffic. The General Manager is of opinion that such a service will meet the needs of the district for some years to come and, as far as I am able to judge, his calculations are correct. It is therefore desirable to defer consideration of railway extension in the Kenia Province at least until the construction of the Uasin Gishu line has been completed.

4. I should in any event be averse from any arrangement which would take the management of any section of railway out of Government control, and it is possible that one reason for Lord Cranworth's anxiety to expedite the construction of this line may be found in the fact that it is of the utmost importance to the development of his timber concession on Mount Kenya.
