Sir,

1. I have the honour to acknowledge  
16985 the receipt of your despatch No. 480 of the  
20th of May on the subject of the Analytical  
Division of the Medical Department.

2. With reference to the suggestion  
contained in paragraph 2 of your despatch I  
consider, after consultation with the Principal  
Medical Officer, that the Veterinary  
Laboratory at Kabete should remain as at  
present a separate institution under the  
control of the Veterinary Pathologist, as its  
organization would not be improved by amalgam-  
ation with the Bacteriological Department.  
Moreover such amalgamation would result in  
friction which might impair the efficiency  
of

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3. I agree, however, that the Laboratories Division could with propriety be separated from the Medical Department and I propose that it should be shown in the draft Estimates for 1915-16 as a separate Department under the control of the Director of Laboratories.

4. I note that the appointment of an Assistant Analyst is approved. The salary of this officer will be shown next year on the establishment of the Laboratories Department at the rate laid down in paragraph 3 of your despatch under reply.

5. I agree with the proposal that the emoluments of the Government Analyst should be increased in 1915-16 to the scale of £400 by £20 to £500, and inasmuch as it is unusual for an assistant to receive the same salary as his superior I should have been prepared to recommend a higher maximum were it not for the fact that the Government Analyst is also remunerated by fees.

6. I agree that the Assistant Analyst should

should draw the fees in the absence of the  
Government Analyst.

With reference to paragraph 6 of  
your despatch, I am informed by the Principal  
Medical Officer that in the absence of Mr.  
Kirkham there is no member of the medical staff  
who can be detailed to carry on his work. It  
may be possible to arrange for the analyses  
of water and milk but the performance of other  
work must be dependent on the time that the  
Assistant Analyst may be able to allot to it  
with due regard to his principal duties in  
connection with the dipping scheme.
