Sir,

I have the honour to offer reply to  
*for Robert*  
paragraph 8 of your despatch No. 596 of June  
23rd, 1914, in which you have intimated to me  
that Professor Simpson adheres to his objection  
to the utilisation of Mumias station as  
a site for the North Kavirondo Industrial  
School.

2. Notwithstanding the Professor's con-  
demnation of the site as a malarious area,  
the fact remains that the mixed population  
of Indians and Africans has resided there  
for years without apparent detriment to health,  
that they have expended their time and invest-  
ed their money in agricultural development,  
and that even if the station be entirely  
abandoned by Government they will remain on  
their

their locations and continue to prosecute the industry which they have successfully commenced.

3. Setting aside for a moment the question of health, it is beyond dispute that Mumias is the centre of the most populous and prosperous mixed agricultural community in this portion of the province and that no other part of the district offers equal opportunity for the dissemination of industrial teaching. It is useless to select a site which is wholly free from malaria if it is situated in a sparsely populated area and in a position too remote to ensure the regular attendance of pupils, or if it is so far removed from the principal agricultural areas that the people will not have the example of modern methods before their eyes. The best results will only be obtained from such a school if it is placed where agricultural industry is most active, and with all deference to the opinion of the Professor I must record my view that the danger to health is not so great as to override the many manifest advantages which combine to render Mumias the most suitable situation.

4. Insufficient weight appears to have been attached by the Professor to the fact

that

that the European staff can be located upon the neighbouring mission hill, which has always been considered a healthy situation, and that those who will receive instruction at the school will continue to reside in the neighbourhood of Mumias whether the institution is placed there or not. I should therefore prefer that the experiment be tried as proposed.

5. I enclose for your information copy of a letter from the Provincial Commissioner, Nyanza, written after perusal of your despatch under reply. Mr. Ainsworth has appended thereto his estimate of probable requirements, the cost of which can be met as follows:-

Buildings from the provision shown on page 100 of the Estimates, item 14.

Staff from the provision of £555 on page 65 of the Estimates.

Materials from the provision of £500 on the same page.

6. It will be observed that the staff proposed by the Provincial Commissioner differs somewhat from that appearing in the Estimates. The provision made was of a tentative nature only, and if you agree that the experiment

experiment should be proceeded with I shall  
be obliged if you will allow me to exercise  
my discretion regarding the engagement and  
salaries of the subordinate staff within the  
provision sanctioned. The headmaster should  
be engaged in England, and the question of the  
employment of an assistant may be deferred for  
the present.

Regarding arrangements for the future administration of the North Kavirondo and Kisumu Districts, and the utilization of the Mumias Station buildings for an Industrial and Agricultural School.

I have the honour to inform you that His Excellency the Governor left a copy of the above-mentioned despatch with me for my observations on the subject of the utilization of the existing Mumias Station for the purposes of an Industrial and Agricultural School.

2. It is observed that Professor Simpson C. M. G. has expressed himself as being opposed to the idea of using the station for the purpose indicated on the ground that as the site is being abandoned as a Government Station because it is feverish and unhealthy the substitution of West Indians or West Africans with a European Headmaster cannot affect its healthiness or unhealthiness.

3. Mumias itself is a centre of a fairly thick native population. On the actual site itself both Lawrence natives, Sudanese, Swahilis, Arabs, Baganda and others have lived for years without any apparent effect on their general health. There is certainly no evidence that the place is unsuited to the health of Africans generally. There is also a fairly large number of Indian traders resident in the Bazaar. The health of these traders has never been so

had as to call for any particular comment. Their stores and places of residence have all along been but temporary and very unsatisfactory owing to the fact that we have never been in a position to grant them permanent sites on which to build. These temporary sheds are more or less from their very nature insanitary. They have no floors and are cramped and unwholesome thereby producing conditions that would tend to ill-health if nothing else would. Notwithstanding all this I should say that their general health has been quite as good as in most other bazaars of a similar nature.

4. There would, therefore, appear to be no particular reason to suppose that the present Muria site is generally unhealthy except for Europeans.

5. The Hill Mission has a station established quite close to Muria station. The Fathers reside at the station and enjoy, I believe, good health. This station is located on a hill immediately to the East of Muria and adjacent to it, and on similar ground there is ample room for the erection of one or two bungalows for Europeans where the residents would be well above the lower living station site.

6. If, therefore, a residence for the Headmaster is built on the higher ground and the station buildings used for the general requirements of the non-European staff and the school work generally, it seems reasonable to allow that the station, when visited by the Inspector, may be utilized for the purposes of an Industrial and Agricultural School as has already been recommended.

7. On the assumption that there will be no objection I submit herewith a revised scheme of expenditure.
