In reply to your despatch No. 602 of  
the 25th of June, I have the honour to inform  
you that leg irons are not universally used by  
convicts employed on extra mural work in this  
Protectorate, but are resorted to only as a  
temporary means of restraint in accordance with  
Section 71 of the Prison Regulations of 1902.

2. A discretionary power in this respect  
is allowed to Superintendents in the case of  
prisoners who have previously endeavoured to  
escape from custody or are considered likely  
to do so. The imposition is only awarded in  
individual cases where personal considerations  
warrant such a course, and in no case as a  
punishment or as a general precaution to  
prevent

prevent escapes.

3. The leg iron now in use is of the chain pattern and weighs 3½ lbs. including ankle guards and straps. It is not considered unduly heavy and is lighter than the bar pattern formerly in use. Cases of hardship from the weight of the irons have not been observed.

4. The leg iron is the only kind of iron used within the prison and then only subject to the restrictions mentioned above. In point of fact scarcely 2% of the prisoners in actual custody have been compelled to wear them.

5. Neck rings and chains for gangs of prisoners are permitted when working in difficult bush or forest country which might facilitate escapes or when in camp at night en route from one prison to another. Their use is, however, not encouraged and they are not employed except in cases of actual necessity.
