THE ELECTRIC SUPPLY LINE ORDINANCE 1914.

MEMORANDUM.

This Ordinance has been drafted in accordance with an intimation given by the Colonial Office to the National Electric Light and Power Company Limited in their letter No. 657/14 of 14th November 1915 that the Government would adopt principles as to compensation to land-owners for way leaves similar to those laid down in the Trinidad Petroleum (Pipes Lines) Ordinance 1911.

2. The Ordinance has followed the Trinidad Ordinance as closely as is compatible with the different objects of the two laws. A comparative table is annexed.

3. Assent may in my opinion be given to the Ordinance without prior reference to the Secretary of State.

THE ELECTRIC SUPPLY LINE ORDINANCE 1914.COMPARATIVE TABLE.

Section.	Remarks.
1.	Short title.
2.	Definitions. It has been considered proper to put a lessee or Owner Land in the position of an owner for the purposes of this Ordinance.
3.	Compare The Trinidad Petroleum (Pipe Lines) Ordinance 1911; hereinafter referred to as the Trinidad Ordinance Section 4. No restriction is placed on persons laying an Electric Supply Line on their own land.
4.	The Trinidad Ordinance Section 5. As this Ordinance is for the purpose of enabling Electric Supply Lines to be carried over land belonging to persons other than those constructing the line it is not considered necessary to embody in it the provisions of Sections 5-7 inclusive of the Trinidad Ordinance.

Section.	Remarks.
5.	The Trinidad Ordinance Section 9. In Sub-Sections 2 and 3 the distribution and amount of compensation has been left to the Magistrate vide also Section 8 of the Electric Supply Line Ordinance 1914.
