Sir,

I have the honour to report that the Director of Education has represented to me the desirability of creating an appointment of Inspector of schools and has asked for permission to include the necessary provision in his draft Estimates for 1915-16.

The reasons for his request are as follows: The schools in the Protectorate are very scattered and, in some instances, somewhat remote and require more frequent visits than the Director of Education can give them. In particular, owing to the increase of salaries of educational posts in India, well-trained and efficient teachers for our Indian schools are

are difficult to obtain and constant supervision is required. It would contribute considerably to the efficiency of the Department if an Inspector could be appointed who would be continually on tour, visiting each school at least once a term, and spending a few days in giving and assisting the teachers and criticising the educational methods employed.

3. Examinations are held in all schools at the end of each term. These will be personally conducted by the Director of Education once in each year according to the following schedule:-

(a) July. European School, Nairobi

Do. Nakuru

Do. Eldoret

(b) December. Indian School, Nairobi

Do. Mombasa

Atah School, Mombasa

Dutch Schools, Uasin Gishu

(c) March. All Mission Schools.

In the remaining two terms of the year Government Schools will be examined either by the teachers or by an interchange of staff, but all written papers will be submitted to the Director of Education for criticism.

4. For the post of Inspector the Director

of

of Education recommends Mr. A. J. Turner, Headmaster of the European School, Nairobi. Mr. Turner has had over ten years' service in this Protectorate and deserves great credit for his teaching and his general management of the School. He is also thoroughly conversant with Indian languages and would therefore be of great assistance in dealing with the Indian Schools. During his last leave of absence, he utilized the opportunity to undergo a course of study of the latest educational methods in vogue both in England and on the Continent, and I am satisfied that he is fully qualified to fill the proposed post. His present salary is £300 by £20 to £400 per annum, and in view of the emoluments enjoyed by Inspectors of Schools in England I consider that a fixed salary of £450 per annum would be by no means excessive.

5. You are aware that the alleged lack of facilities offered for the education of European children in this Protectorate has recently been the subject of much adverse criticism, and I feel that we should do everything that is possible to meet these criticisms and to render the Department more efficient. Mr. Turner recently submitted an

application

application for promotion, forwarded to you
in my despatch No. 19 of the 26th of January,
See 4690 and the Director of Education is very anxious
that his services shall not be lost to the
Department. I trust therefore that my recommend-
ation may be approved and that he may be
offered this appointment at the salary proposed.
