Sir,

I have the honour to report the gallant behaviour of No. 3521 3rd class P.C. Okoth Odawa, Nairobi and my said boy Juma bin Ali in rescuing a Government Kamba porter from drowning in the Tana River at Cha Ngombi on the 12th instant; the river was in flood at the time. After ferrying as many porters over as possible the balance were crossing by means of a raft when the porter fell from his hold and was swept away by the current. The above mentioned men immediately swam in and saved the porter who was twice under water.

I might suggest that the action, the river being in flood and crocodiles being numerous is worthy of some lasting mark being given to the performers.

Mr. A.D.G. Trafford and myself were both witnesses of the action. The porter could not swim and would certainly have been drowned.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 816 of the 6th October bringing to my notice the gallantry of Constable John Adams and Jumma bin Ali in rescuing a government porter from drowning in the Napa River on the 1st August.

2. In order that I may be better able to judge as to the most suitable manner of doing the services of these two men due credit to be done, I have to request that I may be furnished with a more detailed description of the rescue, giving particulars as to the width and depth of the river, the strength of the current, etc., and also with regard to Jumma bin Ali's efforts to rescue another man who was drowning atuary 1912 awarded him with Police Medal for rescuing a drowning man in the Nain River, but that the medal was returned to me by your despatch No. 672 of the 13th July last as it had been found necessary to trace him. It shall be given to him to see whether this is the case or not.
