## Cooly Agreements.

With reference to your letter No.M/71 of March 27th last, regarding the above-mentioned subject, I have the hence to ask that you will arrange through the Protector of Emigrants for representation to be made to the Government of India for the words "and his dependents" to be deleted from Clause 7 of Cooly Agreements with the Uganda Railway, for the following reasons:

I understand that there is a possibility of the Uganda P-ilway incurring responsibility for the passage of impendents of our employees. In our present Cooly Agreements the employee either signs or gives his thumb mark, both being attested, which enables us to form indentification if necessary; it is also the formal completion of the contract, but in the case of dependents there is neither signature nor thumb marks and there is no formal recognition on the part of the Uganda Railway that we acknowledge the dependents and there is no proof that the name of the dependents were in the agreements at the time they were executed.

Under the clauses of these agreements our liabilities are very great as we have to give them passages, edical attendance, quarters, etc., and under the present

Agreemen'

agreement it is possible we might be held responsible to the same extent for the dependents.

I believe the origin of the clause was for emigrants going to set is on farms or to work on team and other plantations where the dependents would be of service, but in the case of the Railway they are of no possible service but rather a source of considerable inconventable and might possibly cause us a liability which is of no service whatever to us. The dependents, unlike the employee, do not have to pass any medical examination and in every way it is not desirable that they should accompany the employee, and for this reason I would ask that the words and his dependents hay be deleted from Clause 7 of every agreement executed in the future.

Remeating that the words and his dependents may be deleted from the existing form of agreement for la-bourers recruited in India for employment on the Uganda Railway.

the Commissioner in Sind has the honor to state that in his epinion sufficient reasons have not been advanced in support of the proposed amendment. From paragraph 3 of the Pretector's letter under reference it appears that the emission preposed is really

net necessary, and the Railway Administration should be informed that for their proposal to receive the consideration of the Government of India, it should be supported by such stronger reasons setting forth more clearly the difficulties actually experienced by them from the operation of the law as it stands at present.

I have the homer to forward the adompanying cony of a letter No.C/19/4/E2 dated 28th April 1914 from the Ceneral "anagor of the Uganda Railway requesting that the words "and his dependents" may be deleted from the existing form of Agreement for labourers recruited in India, for employment on the Uganda Railway.

- 2. The form of Agree ent referred to above was sancti ned under Government Resolution, General Department, Ne.2056 dated 15th April 1897, and it was subsequently amended, vide correspondence ended with Gevernment Resolution, 0.9293 dated 20th December 1913.
- to be a question for the employer and the employee to determine before executing their agreement as to when ther the latter should be allowed to be accompanied by his dependents or not. The wording of the existing form of agreement as to dependents is not compulsory, and does not become operative unless the names of dependents are entered in the table of particulars ammended to the agreement. But considering the fact that

emiy one labourer has accompanied by a dependent during the last 3 years, and that the period of Emigrants' service not being more than 3 years, I am of opinion that the words relating to dependents might be emitted altergether from the form of agreement as requested by the General Manager of the Ugarda Railway.

5. A copy of the existing form of agreement showing the proposed alterations scored out in red lines is herewith forwarded for information.

One of the grievances of our staff is the insufficiency of leifest attendance.

It is said that Medical ail is not always at hand when wanted necessitating the engagement of private loctors and it is suggested properly equipped and staffed Mospital should be opened near the lautes.

- (2). I am quite in accord with this view as to more Medical attendance. Could it be possible to make one of the new landies into a temporary hospital until such time as a regular hospital be provided, or at least a Dispensary might be built with an Hospital delistant or Sub-assistant Surgeon in charge.
- 18). A hospital is urgently wanted as when a man gets sick on the lines another man has to stay away from work to look after him and has maked to give this man full pay. It will be better economy to have a small hospital where all sick could go to. Something like to 50 bels would be wanted to hold all the sick but no loubt a maller number would suffice.
- 10. Could you kindly savise me what will be best to lo to meet he lemand and as to whether you can supply the Medical Staff.

#### Reliens - Uganda Reilway.

As my attention has been directed to meyeral complaints made by the Uganda Railway Staff in Propert of the rations issued to them by the Uganda Railway, the tardy redress of which has is some measure infigenced than in continuing the present strike, and I have discussed the matter with the Meneurable the General Manager, Uganda Railway, and have the honeur to inform you that I have made enquiries and inspections, and desire to present my report.

- 2. Complaints. It has been stated that the rations as issued are defective in two directions:-
  - (a) They are of inferior quality.
- (b) "Sufficient Variety" is not provided.

  N.B. He complaints of any kind have been received from
  the Native Employees. On very few occasions by the
  Asiatics.
- 3. The anthorised Beals sanctioned for issue by the Railway Authorities is as follows:-

It is optional for any man to refuse rations, in which case Rs.5/- per mensem is given in lieu of them, but I am informed that this option is very rarely exercised, and the equivalent mency value taken.

4. A comparison between the amount insued (Asiatic Rations) per meason, and the actual Bassaw cost at Hairobi of the same commedities, shows that to obtain an equal quantity per month would cost any individual more than Rs.5/-. In considering the cost of rations per menth issued to Employees from Mombasa to Kisumu, and the varying rates paid for them at the different centres, it may be taken for granted that the amount issued on the whole system per man per month, exceeds that which any one individual could purchase locally for Rs.5/-.

That this is so, is substantiated by the fact that mency, in lieu of rations is practically universally refused, and the actual food semmedity demanded.

At Hairobi, flour and grain and stored on the ground in an open shed for generally 7 days a month; here again, any reasonable precentions to safeguard the food supply is conspicuous by its absence.

- 10. Comments on the presentions adopted to ensure a proper food supply are called for; but I desire to pay a high tribute to the care exercised by the Chief Storekeeper and his Staff in selecting samples and accepting material in bulk for issue, his experience in dealing with such matters is unequalled in the Country.
  - (a) The precautions adopted by the Central Tender Board in selecting samples are not sarried into effect.
  - (b) Samples accompanying selected tenders are eithed not retained, or kept in a manner that projudices their value when produced for comparison with the same material in bulk.
  - (e) Medical opinion to not obtained at any time.
  - (4) The modical Department through its Sanitation Division is precluded in the terms of contract from contaming any article of feed supplies, and no provision is made in the articles of contract by which powers are conferred on that Division to undertake these important duties.
    - (a) The storage of feed is each that no

guarantee con be afforded to the Public that preemutions are adopted to keep the various considities free from rat infection or deterioration due to wanther.

It is right to say that all sweepings from trucks, stores, as well as condemned stores, are reported on by a heard of Survey on the 19th of each month at Mairobi, and may stores so condemned are destroyed by burning; this precaution precludes the possibility of their being re-issued

### 11. Inspection of Estion Train on 26th July 1914.

Accompanied by the Chief Storekeeper I made an exhaultive inspection of the Ration Train standing in the stores siding on the 28th instant.

Rice. All bags examined, with one exception, were found to contain "white rice" not Balwa; but it was of excellent quality, neither broken or holed, no wasvils.

Once. 29 tims were examined. of these 7 were placed apart to be returned to the Contractor. These were objected to by the Employees on the line, though it had originally satisfied the Indian Staff at the Railway Works.

Taken as a whole the contents of the time were satisfactory; colour, edour and consistency being quite up to the Standard. These to be returned were deficient in colour and in three instances there was some amount of dirt to be found in it.

II Borte. Sealed. Only on being opened was found to contain 203 bags of rice and flour; of these I examined the contents of ten, chosen haphaxardly. In all instances the flour was of the same excellent quality as that contained in I Bogie. Samples from this Bogie I subsequently showed to several coolies who pronounced it of excellent quality.

Ohee. In the Stores waiting for issue. 42 time hermetically scaled, that had already received the approval of the Asiatic Staff were found. Some of these were opened in my presence and the contents were equal to the best "Machakes Chee", which is regarded as the best in the country.

Mains flow. 147 bags were stored on the ground under an iron roof. "Grain and samples showed that "Hickory Kings" many ready far samples. The samples is each case were patisfactory, though the colour, relative percentage of bran to flour, naturally pro-

prejudiced the "mixed" when compared to the milled specimen of "Hickory King".

It was observed that samples were "once grushed" samples.

I give it as my definite opinion that the samples of food I examined on the 29th instant were of good quality, and suitable in every way as hutan food.

Mote. It frequently happens t t if bags become damp that a certain amount of the contained material adheres to the bag, and becomes rolled uni fibrous. It is this material that is often produced by a discontented recipient. I am assured by the Chief Storekeeper that if any bage are observed that show signs of moisture or dampness, the contents, if on investigation are found to be free from sould and of good quality; is sieved. rebagged and issued.

#### 12. "Sufficient Variety".

On enquiry I find that the issue of the fellowing commedities to the Staff has been discentinued for many years .

Chillies, Curry Fowder, Fish, Jaggery (Sugar) Freen Vegetables (Pumpkins, Potatoes).

A comparison between the scales of diets authorised by the Medical and Hailway Departments is here shown.

In early case it is assumed that the issue of rations is on a basis of sufficiency to maintain a working man in a healthy condition. It smould be borne in cind that in addition to the scale shown above, the medical diet includes the issue of a meat ration in certain cases.

The Railway diet is deficient in nitrogenous elements (meat) carbo hydra value (sugar) corrective constituents (curry); vegetable salts, legumins and extractives, but in every case these deficiencies would appear to be supplied by the individual, though at one period they were certainly issued as rations.

If it be the intention of the Railway to supply a full and satisfactory diet to all their employees, then their reiscue should at once be made; if on the exher hand, the diet issued is considered to be a substantial addition to the salaries enjoyed, and a ration to supply the bare necessities of life, then it is amply sufficient. I cm in ignorance which intention it is desired to satisfy.

- 13. The following recommendations should without delay be adepted:-
  - The prevision of properly built rat proof, well wentilated grain and flour stores in all localities where it is found desirable that such committies should be stored.
  - II. The inclusion of a clause inter alia in the articles of centract by which powers to inspect and condemn any sample, at all times, be given to the dedical Department.
  - III. The Medical Department should be represented on all occasions when samples of foed stuffs are considered, and the opinion of the representative

representative of that Department recorded as to the quality of any selected sample.

- IV. Scleeted samples to be retained in glass bottles, seeled, numbered and dated at the head office.
  Such accepted samples to be available for inspection at all times by any person authorised to superintend the food supply.
  - The medical pepartment should be instructed to inspect, report on and cendemn, if necessary, any foed commodities, it all times and in all places where it may be considered desirable.
