Sir,

I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of a letter from the Acting General Manager relating to the purchase of a pontoon as a Landing Stage at Kifidini and to inform you that in the circumstances I have felt bound to accede to Mr. Eastwood's request and to give provisional sanction for the expenditure involved.

2. It is only on Mr. Taylor's departure and Mr. Eastwood's assumption of office that I have been made aware of the procedure adopted in this case and I have found it necessary to place on record my strong disapproval of a course of action which in my opinion is both uncalled for and undesirable.

3. The practice of putting forward requisitions at the last moment on the plea of urgency is one which I can in no way commend. In the present

case there would have been ample time to report the condition of the landing stage and to obtain your covering sanction before any action need have been taken here, but the General Manager has chosen to place an order and incur expenditure without authority and has delayed his report until it is too late to take any course other than that requested.

4. I have no doubt as to the propriety of the object for which the money is asked but the fact that such is the case in no way justifies Mr. Taylor in committing an absolutely needless irregularity and I can only say that he does not appear to have grasped the principles underlying the regulations laid down for the financial control of the Railway.

Landing Stage at Kilindini Pier

SIR,

I have the honour to request that you will place before his Excellency the necessity of a landing stage for passengers at Kilindini Pier, and obtain his sanction to the expenditure of £1,650 for this purpose. The expenditure would be met from the appropriation of £40,000 for improvement to Kilindini provided for in the loan of £395,000.

The steps at Kilindini Pier that are now used by passengers in connection with the steamers laying in Kilindini Harbour are old and unsafe. They have been reported on by the District Engineer in charge of the III Maintenance Division as follows :

Landing Stage - Kilindini.

- * The present structure is getting worse and worse and is only held in position by the piles and bracing of the centre gangway.
- * Any attempt at mooring a pontoon to the steps would I am certain result in the whole structure carrying away. The timber of the piles is so badly eaten that there is absolutely nothing to which bracing can be fixed to strengthen it!

It was thought that a pontoon could be made out of barrels, as a temporary measure, but this was not workable, as owing to past experience we found that barrels are almost immediately perforated by the "Torpedo Navalis". We tried rafts buoyed in this manner when dredging the foundations of the present pier.

The most suitable method of landing is by a pontoon moored to the side of the wharf by two gangways. The General Manager after enquiring and full consideration of the necessities of the situation was so impressed by its importance that he ordered a pontoon and the iron whip and mooring gear in connection with it, in July last.

This does not appear to have been sanctioned, and I therefore shall be greatly obliged if you will ask His Excellency to regularise the expenditure. The matter is rather urgent, as instructions ought to be issued at once in connection with the decking.

It was intended in the first place that the decking should be obtained and fixed locally, but it will be better and more economical if it is sent by the makers at the same time as the ironwork.
