Sir,

With reference to my secret despatch of September 21, 1914, I have the honour to transmit for your perusal copy of the War Diary furnished by the Headquarters Staff Office for the period September 1 to October 6 inclusive. Information up to September 18 was sent to you under cover of my last despatch, but I have thought it unnecessary to withhold the earlier part of the diary now enclosed merely in order to avoid recapitulation.

2. As information regarding military measures in all parts of the Protectorate is now included in this diary, the weekly reports by the Provincial Commissioner, Mombasa, on the same subject have been discontinued.

3. It is difficult to conceive with what object the Germans are making these continuous raids which they appear to be quite unable to press home to their advantage. They have in no instance been even approximately successful, and the repulses which they have suffered must read unfavourably on the minds of

whites and natives alike.

4. I am informed that the conduct and spirit of all classes of our troops is excellent, but I am also aware that the members of the Volunteer Forces are becoming somewhat impatient at not having been permitted to assume the offensive.

5. I desire to refer to one statement in the enclosed diary which is misleading. On page 25, para. 5, it is recorded that the tug 'Kavirondo' was completely disabled. This reads as though the displacement had been effected by the enemy, but such is not the case. She damaged her propeller by striking a snag in shallow water.

- 5.8.14. Namanga. Two Germans caught with 3½ lbs dynamite close to the railway line.
- 5.8.14. Vanga. Mr Dickson, A.D.C. reported that Vanga was attacked by 250 Germans with 8 officers and 3 guns. The latter report said that this attack was confined to a reconnaissance only.
- 5.8.14. Muktau. Three motor cyclists were fired on just south of Muktau, and one wounded was severely wounded.
- 5.8.14. Omo River. A company of infantry were fired on by a strong party of Germans, 32 men, 1 machine and 1 pick fire. Casualties 2 slightly wounded, supply's casualties about 5.

"German East Africa has German Regulars, 14 native Companies of 152 men each with 3 maxim guns, 1500 to 2000 Germans in Colony are formed into a defence force. German Government can put 8,000 natives irregulars into the field fully armed. They have 60 guns of about 1 inch calibre and some bigger ones, also approximately 100 maxims."

The Governor received information that Northern Rhodesia and Nyassaland are collecting small forces to defend their frontiers. Nyassaland has 550 native troops and 14 European Volunteers. Northern Rhodesia has small detachments at Fife and Aheropan which may possibly be supplemented by 200 men from Southern Rhodesia.

From 28th September 1914 to 6th October 1914.

PM 28th Sept
Nairobi.

All quiet in the Kisumu, Kiciti, Masai Reserve,
and Magadi Districts.

Taveta District. Swahili scouts located a post
of the enemy on the road about 2 miles on the
Taveta side of Mbwayuni. This post has a gun
and a Maxim. Strength estimated to be between
100-200. 2.C. Cos. captured Lieut. Cholley
and some men, who were sent out from Frost
at the junction of the Taveta and M

Kisumu, Kisii, Masai Reserve, and Magadi Districts reported quiet.

Tavio Area. Lt. Collyer reports that a force of 150 enemy had been located five and a half hours above the camp at Moshema on the Tavio River; it subsequently retired up the Embu River towards the border. Lt. Pardoe with "D" Company R.A.R. is near Kivokoni scouting up the river.

O.C. Mombasa reports that the S.S. Duplex will arrive with Lt. Seames and 100 camels from Jubaland.

Kisumu, Kisii, Masai Reserve, and Magadi Districts reported quiet.

Coast Area. Lt. Dickson reports that a force of about 500 enemy left Marjoreni on the 29th and retired to Jassin or Lushanga. This force is reported to be based on Kivururu near Jassin and on Mwakimbe and that there is a small force near at Kiwakapori near M'Chonio.

O.C. Mombasa considers it necessary for the attackmen these positions.

The native disturbance in Girians appears to be settling down; the Provincial Commissioner is arranging terms.

Intelligence Agent Postma (captured on 8.9.14.) has escaped from Mwanza and reports that the enemy have posts at Ikenye (4 white men, 35 askaris, 1 maxim, 1 field gun) Odenya, Kamailumowa, Roga, and Edasegera also 40 miles down Amala River near Goroind (6 whites 30 askaris) Mwanza (100 white and 800 askaris).

O.C. Voi reports that Lt. Col. von Rock was killed in the attack on Frost's Camp on the 26th.

S.S. Duplex with camel from Jubaland has arrived at Nairobi also H.M.S. Dartmouth.

H.M.S. Chatham reported to be ashore 2 miles from Mombasa.

pm. 3rd Oct.

The remainder of Force "C" arrived in Steamers "Bandra Begum" and "Umfuli". H.M.S. Chatham was refloated apparently undamaged.

O.C. Entebbe states that the disposition of Belgian Troops on the border near Ruteshuru renders an advance of German troops on Lbarara unlikely. One Company 29th Punjabis reached Nairobi from Magadi Junction. All reported quiet on the German border. Mr McGearty a pioneer motor cyclist who was wounded and captured by the enemy is reported to have died of his wounds while a prisoner.

Nasai Reserve and Tsavo Districts reported quiet. Kisii and Kisumu Districts. The enemy were reported to be concentrating at Buhi. These Intelligence agents are crossing the border to obtain reliable information.

Coast area. Captain Stonor expects to be attacked at Gazi as soon as the enemy receives reinforcements. The Jhili Infantry and a section of Maxim guns were expected to arrive at Gazi to-day per S.S. Duplex. The company of the 29th Punjaubis were marching from Mameras via Tiwi to Gazi.

The 15 pounder Volunteer Battery, less one section, a section of Maxim Volunteers, the rest of the 27th Mountain Battery arrived at Nairobi.
