I think that this day and end clear up
the matter at last. The evidence produced
by the Acting Paymaster shows that Lt. Coffin
arrived on 21 June, not 24 June, and that he is
allowed 11 days for the voyage, he should have
come on to India pay from 2 July inclusive.
On 5/7/87 we paid up to 25 June ~~from 24 June~~^{to 25 June} inclusive,
£ 18-5-0 and advanced £ 30 for local
allowances, pending a decision on the question.
It has now been decided that Special Services
Officers shall be allowed 15/- a day local allowance
under § 21 of the XAR Reg^t (see 60326), and
so £ 87-5/- due to Lt. Coffin.

With reference to your despatch No. 926
of the 10th ultimo and previous correspondence

362/- is a final charge against the funds of

Lieutenant Coffin.

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re Pay issued to Lieut.Coffin, Late Supply &
Transport Officer, Murchison Falls.

Reference S.8853 of 3rd October and 3rd November, 1914.

In letter No.M.2099 12628, of 27th August 1914, from the Assistant Military Secretary, India Office to the Under Secretary Of State, Colonial Office, it is stated that Lieut.Coffin "did not sail till the 24th June last". I attach, hereto, copy of a letter I received from Capt.Sweeny, dated 21st June 1914, in which that Officer stated that Lieut.Coffin "sailed from Kisimayu today on the S.S.Perto De Savone" proceeding direct to England" etc. I understand from the sources that the Steamer did actually sail from Kisimayu on that date.

2. In Colonial Office Despatch No.31623/1914 of 24th August 1914, addressed to the Under Secretary of State, Military Department, India Office, it is stated that Lieut.Coffin "would have been due to arrive at Bombay on the 3rd of July and Mr. Harcourt considers that that date may be taken as the date from which he "should be brought on pay from Indian Army Funds".

The normal passage to India from Mombasa or Kisimayu, is, however, only 11 days, and I presume Lieut.Coffin should be paid by the Protectorate from 21st June to 1st July inclusive, and be brought on pay from Indian Army Funds as from 2nd July 1914.

3. In letter No.M.14940 of the 26th September 1914, from the Military Secretary, India Office, to the Under Secretary of State, Colonial Office, it is stated that Lieut.Coffin took an "advance of Rs. 480/- being approximately the amount of passage money due for the "journey to Bombay".

Captain. Sweeny's letter referred to in Para 1, hereto, has a Postscript from which it will be seen that the amount of the advance received by Lieut.Coffin was Rs.382/- and not Rs.480/-. This amount has not been charged against Lieut.Coffin, because, at the time, there was some doubt as to this Protectorate's liability for passage money in lieu of a passage back to India.

4. Lieut.Coffin informed this Office in a letter dated 11/4/14 that he had opened an account with the National Bank of India Ltd, Mombasa, and asked that his salary might be paid in to it. In accordance with this request, his salary was paid to the Bank as it became due. Before he left Kisumu only his salary up to 31st May 1914 had been paid in, ^{and} but the amount due to him from 1st to 20th June was not paid in till after he had sailed.

The Bank accepted the payment, and the liability of this Office in this respect ceased. It was presumed that Lieut.Coffin would make his own arrangements for the ~~closing~~ ^{and} of his Bank account.

5. From the foregoing it will be seen that all the money due to Lieut.Coffin on the basis of his Indian pay from the date to which he was paid in India (28th February 1914) to the day previous to his leaving Kisumu (20th June 1914), has been paid in to his Bank account in Mombasa, in accordance with his instructions.

6. He is also due pay from Protectorate Funds for the normal period of a voyage between Kisumu & Bombay (11 days), which amounts to £.35-12/- as under:-

Further, it has now been decided that he is to benefit by the terms of K.A.R. Regulation No. 211, thus receiving £5/- per diem for every day spent in Africa, ^{- 5/-} 7/6 per diem during the voyages to and from Africa. This will make an additional sum of £ 51. due to Light. Coffin, we under-

7. From letter No.M.12528 of 27th August 1914 from the Assistant Military Secretary, India Office, to the Under Secretary of State, Colonial Office, it will be seen that sum of 243-5/- has already been paid to Lieut. Coffin. The amount now due him would therefore appear to be £ 51-7-9, made up as follows:-
