Your cypher telegram 30th August; possibly
one half Northern Masai has moved extended Southern
Reserve quite voluntarily. Fulk of the remainder
impeded by cold and rain fell back on European
farms. I immediately sent Secretary for Native
Affairs, Director of Agriculture and Mr. Gainsworth to
investigate and to meet Elders. It is recommended that
Masai on European farms should for the present
fall back upon grazing available on East African
Syndicate and lower parts of Laikipia. Am sending
for the Chiefs. Will send full report by next
mail. In my opinion move has been pressed too
quickly. Masai are all quiet.
