Sir:-

On August 25th we prepared the enclosed letter, but we came to the conclusion at the time, that probably the Foreign Office was better acquainted with all the facts of the case than we were.

We, however, notice now, that owing to some action taking place in British East Africa, there is fighting going on.

It would undoubtedly be of great advantage, if the machinery that is being exhibited by Friederich Krupp and Company can be secured, because it would give the English Manufacturers full details of the machinery that is being used extensively in German East Africa.

Sir:-

We venture to draw your attention to the fact, that in German East Africa considerable quantities of Sisal fibre are grown, and this is useful in the manufacture of Cords, Ropes and Binder Twine.

The quantity grown there is from 20/25,000 tons per annum.

Owing to the disturbed condition of Mexico there may be a shortage of Mexican Sisal, and that, coupled with the stoppage of Sisal fibre from German East Africa might cause difficulties.

We have in British East Africa, near to Nairobi, some 30,000 acres of land, which we are planting with Sisal plants, but which will not come to maturity until 1917.

We know that the German factories are fully equip-

ped

equipped with Decorticating Machinery, that the plants are yielding, and that all that is required is to keep the machinery and plantations at work, and immediately a constant supply of fibre can be procured.

We estimate that such fibre would bring in London anything from £20 to £30 per ton. At present the price is £26, but with a shortage it is likely to increase to £30, and so 25,000 tons of Sisal at £30 per ton would yield £750,000.

In the Spring of 1913 we visited the firm of Friederich Krupp and Company of Magdeburg, who have fitted up most of these German factories with Decorticating Machinery, and this firm have at the present moment a large exhibition of their machinery at the Paris-Salon. This machinery is most suited for the extraction of the fibre out of the leaves of the Sisal plant.

We have associated with us in our venture Mr. Ewart S. Grogan, who is at present at Nairobi, and Mr. W. C. Hunter Postal Box 96, Sixth Avenue, Nairobi,

who

who is also the Secretary for several sisal plantations that have just arrived at the producing areas in British East Africa.

The natives in German East Africa have been thoroughly trained to the work, and it would only be necessary to have a certain amount of white supervision in order that the factories and plantations might continue. Sir Percy Girouard, the late Governor General, can no doubt give further information.

We trust this information may be of some use, and remain, &c.,
