Africa, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to
transmit herewith a copy of a telegram from Sir F.
Villiers reporting the action now taken by the Belgian
Government.

I am to request that the information contained in the last paragraph of this telegram regarding the present activities of the Belgian Government may be taken into consideration in consistion with the views expressed in my letter of the 24th instant 61632/14, and I am to observe that this Department, as well as the Belgian Government, has as yet no information regarding the intentions of the military authorities in British East Africa or as to the prospects of an early offensive by

Under Secretary of State,

by British troops from the Protectorate against German territory.

I am to submit, for Mr. Secretary Harcourt's consideration that, should it be deemed inadvisable to communicate these intentions and prospects fully to the Belgian Government, enough should at any rate be communicated to them to allay their apprehensions as to the possibility of a serious German offensive against the Congo.

Decypher, Sir R., Villiers: he Harre, October 28th (D. 4.45.p.m. R. 6.30, p.m. Gotober 28th.)

I addressed note to Belgian Government inaccordance with instructions in your despatch No. 121 and your telegram No. 30 and Belgian Government accordingly sent orders for Belgian force to be withdrawn.

From a telegram just received from Governor of Katansa it seems doubtful whether this has yet been done and it appears that as recently as October 21st he had been in correspondence with High: Commissioner for South Africa and had received impression that the High Commissioner desired Belgian co-operation. Belgian Government are however again telegraphing to Governor of Katanga to withdraw force at once and to warn High Commissioner that this is being done.

At the same time Belgian Government state that circumstances may make it advisable for them to modify their original policy of acting strictly on defensive and their local authorities have accordingly been instructed that they may take offensive if such a step appears to offer best hope of preventing invasion of the Collay.
