

BAST AFRICA AND UGANDA.

PROPOSED AMALGAMATION OF TELEGRAPH MIGHTERING
DEPARTMENT TITH THE POST OFFICE AND TELEGRAPHS
UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE POSTMASTER GITERALS

PERSENT ARRANGEMENTS.

1. The existing Post and Telegraph services In Bast Africa and Uganda consist of :-

- (a) A Fust and Telegrap epartment under the direct control of the Postmaster

 General of the two Frotectorates which deals with the actual Post and Telegraph traffic and all relations with the public in respect of Post and Telegraph business.
- and
 (b) A Telegraph Construction and Maintenance
 Department under the supervision of the
 Superintendent of Telegraphs, which deals
 with purely engineering matters such as
 the construction and maintenance of
 telegraphs.
- 2. The Postmaster General deals with the, general finance and arrangements of the Post and Telegraph services, and is primarily responsible to the Governors of both Protectorates for their efficiency.

He is also the Officer to whom the public look for redress in case of errors or unsatisfactory service. Thilst at times expected to use his influence he has no actual powers of control in respect of the Engineering staff, although the Engineering branch may be said to be a sub-department of the Post Office.

This system by which the Postmaster 3. General has authority only in respect of some four fifths of the staff; and is considered respondible - at least by the public - for the efficiency of the service generally, is not satisfactory. The staffs of the two branches are recruited from different sources. That of the Postmaster General is largely drawn from the British Post Office whilst with two or three exceptions the Engineering staff may be said to be drawn from every available source other than the British Post Office. absence of a common training, as an added factor to the absence of a common control, makes for friction and militates against an efficient go open tion, between the two branches of the The existing arrangement is both Department. unusual and unsatisfactory, and the fusion of the Engineering branch with the Postmister General's Department is sought in order to ensure improved co-operation and efficiency.

PROPOSED HAVISION AS APPROVED BUSY APRICA.

HEADQUARTER STAFF.

- It is proposed that the title of the Superintendent of Telegraphs (Mr. Caine) be altered to that of Deputy Postmester General and Chief Telegraph Engineer. He would have the immediate supervision of the more important Engineering matters and saist generally in the work of the amalgaurted Dapartment. He would rank next to the Postamater General to whom he would be responsible, and in show beence he would assume control of the whole Post and Telegraph service. Mr. Calme would retain his present personal rank and the right to wear the Pifth Class Civil Service Uniform. It is suggested that in consideration of mis saded responsibilities his salary should be increased by the addition of a "Duty Allowance" of £50 per annum. In this connection it is pointed out that his present salary has remained unchanged for q years.
- 5. Ir. Creighton, the present issistant
 Superintendent of Telegraphs for Best Africa, to
 be given the title of "Telegraph Engineer". He
 would deal with Engineering metters generally,
 subject is the direction of the Chief Telegraph
 Incineer, and as a result of the additional
 over Mr. Caines present duties to a sufficient

extent to enable the latter to give the attention to the general Departmental work contemplated in paragramh 4 above. He would act as Chief Telegraph Engineer (but not as Deputy Postmester General) in Mr. Caine's absence. Mr. Creighton's personal rank would be next below Mr. Caine, but he would be considered purely as an Engineer. would have the immediate supervision of the Engineering staff but would take no part in the general administration of the Post Office in respect of its relations with the public and other Government Departments. Wr. Oreighton is now on scale £350 210 to £450, and is at present receiving £ 340. It is proposed that he should be placed on the same scale as Mr. Killingbook, viz. £350 by £20 to £450. duties would become quite as important as those of the Assistant Postmuster General

- 6. The Assistant Postmester General (Mr. Killingbeck) to retain his present duties and scale of salary. He would rank next below Captain Wallace who is refered to under the heading of Ugammu.
- A new Assistant Telegraph Engineer to be recruited from the British Peat Office. This Officer should have all-round experience of the erection and maintenance of overhead land line Telegraphs and Telephones in the United Kingdom, and if possible some knowledge of the practical erection.

In view of the leave which will It ll das next year it is desirable that the proposed new pocintment be made in time to permit of the person selected arriving in East Africa not later than the end of April next.

DISTRICT STAFF.

8. The District Telegraph Inspectors
(Sub-Angineers) would report to the Telegraph
3. inser who would deal with routine metters
and pass to the Deputy Postmaster weneral and
Chief Telegraph in the result poers as required
his attention. Serious matters affecting the
efficiency of the Service would be brought before
the Bead of the Department, but in the ordinary
way the Engineering staff would be dealt with by
or through, their Engineering superior officers.

Postmasters and the District Telegraph Engineering staff would remain unaltered so far as the European Officers are concerned, but the coloured staff on both sides would become subordinate to the European. For example European Officers of the Engineering breach would exercise a much needed supervision ever the many Indian Eub-Postmasters in singlehended charge of outlying Post and Telegraph Offices.

Similarly European Postmasters would be responsible for the control of fidern and fative Telegraph licement at local value as where no ingineering Officer is stationed.

At present the Bostmaster General and the Superintendent of Telegraphs may be inspecting the same Station at the same time, one thending to questions affecting public business and the other to Smineering matters, and the same applies to junior efficers.

In the event of sickness or special emergency European District Postmusters would be required to temporarily take over the duties of European Sub-Engineers; The by mutual arrangement to supervise coloured Working parties when the Sub-Engineer is beent on line rep irs.

ACCOUNTING, STOREKEEPING AND OFFICES.

12. There would be one accounting branch common to the amalgamated Department from which all payments of salaries &c would be made. The Engineering Storekeeping would also be combined with that of the Post Office at the smaller centres, and the system of separate offices in different parts of a township, one for the Post Office and another for the Engineering branch, could be dispensed with.

PROPOSED REVISION AS APPROTING UGAFDA.

13. For some time past the need has been felt for the appointment of an Officer of the rank of Assistant Postmaster General to be stationed in Uganda. Mr. Killingbeck was sent to Uganda some time since but had to be withdrawn for work at Head-quarters. More recently a First Class Postmaster has been stationed at Entebbe with certain general powers of supervision, but this has not been entirely satisfactory - an Officer of higher standing and authority is required.

CAPTAIN WALLACE.

14. It is proposed that Captain Wallace should combine a certain authority and responsibility for the general work of the Department with his present Engineering functions, and that he be given the title of Assistant Postmaster General. He would

the immediate supervision of the whole of the Post and referraph staff in the Ugenda Protectorate, with authority to dispose of miner questions affecting the public and the various Departments of the Uganda Government, so avoiding the delay at present necessitated by reference to Nairobi. He would report to the Postmaster General on matters of public business and questions affecting the general administration of the Department, can to the Chief Telegraph Engineer (and Deputy Postmester General) on purely Angineering metters. His personal rank in the Department would be next below tr. Creight on and next senior to Mr. Killing beck. Captain Wallace is now at the maximum (2400) of his present scale of pay and it is proposed that this be increased to £450 by annual increments of SEC in view of the saded responsibilities suggested. with this incresse should be associated a limbility for service in the Bast Africa Protectorate if called upon without his being in any way entitled to transfer from Uganda to Bast Africa.

MR. GODVIN.

Is. Mr. Godwin, at present Junior Assistant Superintendent of Tolographs, to have the title of Junior Telegraph Engineer. His duties would be purely Engineering, except in so far as combination of functions is contemplated in the following paragraphs.

DISTRICT STAFF.

- The ceneral arrangements for the district staff would be similar in principle to those for Bast Africa as outlined in paragraphs & to 11. Reports on Engineering matters would be made to Captain Wellace who would deal with them personally or forward the papers to Nairobi according to the nature and importance of the subject dealt with. Reports affecting public business and ordinary. routine (non-engines ing) would either be sent through Captain Walles or direct to the Postmaster General's Office at Narabi according to their nature. The procedure in this respect would be somewhat on the lines in which certain classes of the reports of Poster sters in England are sent to the District Surveyors and others moct to St Martins le Grend.
- 17. The combination of functions of District
 Postmaters and District Sub-Engineers would be
 greater in Ugenda than in East Africa. There would
 be no necessity, for example, to maintain both a
 European Postmater and a European representative
 of the Engineering branch to supervise a few Indian
 Officials and Mative employees in the Nile Province.



FINANCIAL

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FINANCIAL AND OTHER ARRANGEMENTS BETWEEN THE TWO PROTECTORATES.

18. Under the present system the expenditure of the Post and Telegraph services is divided between the two Protectorates as follows:

The Bost Africa Estimates include :-

- (a) The entire cost of the Post Office (including the working of the telegraphs) in both Protectorstes.
- (b) The entire cost of construction and maintenance of clagraphs in Bast Africa.

and the Ugenda Estimutes are charged with

- (c) The cost of construction and maintenance of Telegraphs in Uganda.
- and Core half of Mr. Caime's salery (£800) and £ 10 towards his office expenses.

There is an adjustment of account by which, on the one hand, the Ugenda Administration refunds to East Africa the estimated cost of working of the telegraphs in Ugenda, and receives, on the other hand, the whole of the Telegraph Revenue collected in Ugenda. The net result is that each Protectorate provides for its own capital expenditure for telegraph construction, and the loss on the working and maintenance of the Post and Telegraph services

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is distributed between them meither being Charged with the value of the services performed by the Post Office for other Departments of Government.

- It is not proposed to alter this arrange-The cost of the additional Assistant mem t. Telegraph Engineer and the proposed duty allowance to Mr. Caine would be borne by East Africa, and the addition of salary to Captain Wallace would be borne by Ugenda. The First Class Postmester at Entebbe would be withdrawn on Captuin Wellage ing over the local control of the combined staff, and a Second Class Postmaster substituted. This would reduce the charge against Trands for "Telegraph Working". Certain economies would result from the combination of functions by the District staf but these would probably be absorbed in meeting the extra work arising from the development of the country on completion of the Jinja/Kakindu Railway, . which will otherwise presently necessitate an increased staff.
 - 20. The system by which igenda purchases its own telegraph material, Engineering stores to and works on "Marlfoottal Stores" stope would remain in operation. Engineering stores belonging to the respective Protectorates would not be transferred except by mutual arrangement.
 - 21. The Ugenda staff would be kept up to atrength under the arrangements now in force and remain subject to the control of the Governor of

Dganda. Unless by mutual arrangement Officers borne on the Uganda Estimates would not be utilized for East Africa. The operative staff of the Post Office which would continue to be borne on the East Africa Estimates would, however, be interchangeable between the two Protectorates as at present.

With the exception of the alterations enumerated the working of the Post and Telegraph services generally would be on the same lines as hitherto, the cost of the Post Office being borne by Bast Africa whilst cost of telegraph construction and maintenance walk be borne by each Protectorate separately. The telegraph construction programmes of the two Programmes would remain separate and distinct and subject to the control of the respective Governors. The Postmester General would continue to report to the Chief Secretaries of both Protectorates on matters : ffecting either covernment individually. and would be responsible in to the Governor of each Protectorate for the efficiency of its local Post and Telegraph arrangements.
