Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that the question has arisen as to whether European non-gazetted officials other than clerks are entitled to receive house allowance at the rate of £40 per annum.

2. In the past officials of this class, who were entitled to free quarters under the terms of their appointments, have been granted house allowance at the rate of £36 per annum when free quarters were not available, but now that the rate of house allowance for European clerks has been raised to £40 per annum (vide your despatch No. 69 of the 10th February 1911) I would ask that this privilege may also be extended to the above mentioned class of officials both on permanent and temporary appointments.
