It is also practically certain that we could not have done so even in the middle of last year, and that the extent to which we could have gone would have been to attempt to bluff them into signing aupplementary agreement.

2. Though Wr.WacDonald expresses a doubt whether one of the farms, that known as Neivesha, is sufficiently equipped as regarde buildings, still the work done on the others is so such in excess of the Syndicate's minimum obligations that ' think you will agree that we may reasonably be satisfied.

3. It is not quite certain how much development was actually complete toy July 19th but in all probability practically the whole of the existing buildings were finished by them.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the my recommon five farms (of not less than 5,000 acres each) which in accordance with an agreement of the Bist Africa Syndicate, had by the 12th July IJII, to be a dequately equipped to the satisfaction of the Milector of Agriculture, with dwelling to the satisfaction of the Milector fences, and also the live and that subclines satisfaction for the use and development of the land for a lie frame and ranching purposes.

This farm is not suitable for dry land cultivation. the climatic conditions being unfavourable; but a dam has been consuracted across the Gilgil River at a cost of about £130, and a furrow taken out and some 50 acres of crops complising, dicerne, Rape, Carlots etc are grown. under irrigation.

One hundred to one hundred and fifty That of butter is made weekly in the dairy, and from 300 to 1,000 acres & of scrub land has been thinned out and the land converted into good grawing.

Tome 400 acres have been brought under cultivation, but only about 60 acres has as yet been eropped; an excellent crop of barley on 25 acres is now being harvested, and small erops of tinseed and peas are nearing maturity.

Naivasha farm is the only one of the five about which a doubt exists as to whether development done fulfils the terms of the agreement. It is true the number of stock is equal, if not greater than the carrying capacity of the holding. On the other hand, the buildings are meagre, and not my to the requirements of a self-contained farm.

But taking into consideration the fact that the other farms are fairly well furnished, and that the graph stock on hand, viz:- over \$1,000 steep, 500 head of battle, besides houses, males, donkeys and pigs, is in excess of what might be considered five farms of 5,000 acres manh will carry, and furnier that there are dealt to have been fulfilled.

I may state that seventy to one hundred miles of fencing have been created on the property. Some of the wire has been stolen by natives, and many of the poles have fallen to the ground through crass fires, and damage has been done by came.

A large amount of money has been seent in enclosing large areas, but the fences in their present condition are of no value except as land-marks, and have not therefore been taken into consideration in the report.
