I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of pour letter No.13 dated the 19th June conveying to me the authority of the Marquess of Lanadowne to engage a European Clerk at a Rs.600. salary not exceeding Six hundred Rupees - winth (or say Four A480. hundred and eighty Pounds sterling per armum) who should be capable of assisting me generally and of relacing me suring may absence.

- 2. The appointment is to be of a non-pensionable 2480. character and the cost of Four hundred and eighty Pounds will be equally divided between the Protectorates of East Africa, Uganda and British Jentral Africa.
