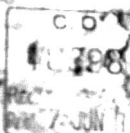

of German East Africa <sup>adopted</sup>  
by the German authorities  
constituted by your constitution  
an assumption of diplomatic  
function by the <sup>German</sup> ~~the~~ Council  
which is most irregular.  
Correspondence in matters of  
minor importance should be  
conducted between you and  
the German Governor direct,  
but matters of greater  
importance should naturally  
flow to be dealt with between  
the German and the  
British Foreign Offices.

A. Several questions  
relating to counter cores,  
such as those raised in  
your despatch, though  
apparently of little  
importance, have caused a  
considerable amount of  
trouble in other parts of  
the Engine and I am  
glad to learn that  
close attention is being  
paid to them in the  
East Africa Port.
