

At present I am

forwarded by the Secretary of State for the Colonies to inform

you that my purpose in visiting Gen. H. Laycock, Major
Royal Horse Corps, last of the 3rd Battalion, R.H.C.,
for information as to his rank as Inspector of
the Armistice forces, with salary at the rate
of £1000 per annum, and such as District Commd.
I am so remiss as to be unable to name the Army Council to

whom it will appear no objection for the services of this officer being placed at

the disposal of this Department. He has made arrangements to travel

are unknown. It is necessary, therefore, to have
